St. Patrick!

Patrick was born in Scotland and his father was a Roman Military Officer which Patrick plan to become, however, at the age of 16 he was kidnapped by Irish pirates and taken to Ireland. For the next six years he worked as a shepherd suffering from the cold and starvation. He escaped aboard a German vessel paying his way back to Scotland by taking care of a pack of stolen dogs the crew planned to sell. Patrick was a changed man and had a vision to serve the people of Ireland by becoming a priest. He returned to Ireland and evangelized most of the Irish people by building Churches and helping the poor tribal people. Since Patrick knew the Gaelic language and had been a slave the Irish accepted his message. Patrick died in Ireland on March 17, 460.
