

The Regis tradition continues!








201 REGIS HIGH SCHOOL Senior Exit Survey


Did you have a positive learning experience at Regis High School?




Overall, how would you rate the learning environment at Regis High School?






Overall, how well did your experience at Regis High School help you become a positive contributing member of society?



> This year I believe our chaplain at Regis and the campus minister have truly helped me to grow closer with the Lord. Attending


Mass at Regis allows me to really reflect on how great Regis is. All of the faculty and staff has an everlasting love for the students and the community.

BASEBALL

The 2017 Regis Ramblers Baseball team will be remembered as one of the best in the 64 season history of the program. In finishing 22 and 4 overall and 13 and 1 in the Western Cloverbelt, numerous team and individual milestones were reached and records were set.

The more noteworthy team marks included:

- Most wins (22) in a regular season
- Most wins in a row (12) to start a season
- Highest preseason state ranking (4th)
- Highest state ranking to finish a season (3rd)
- The first outright conference title since 2005 and the 7th in the program's existence
- Most single-season hits (258), triples (15), RBIs (192), runs scored (231), and total bases (357)
- Highest single-season batting average (.370) and slugging percentage (.511)
- Most single-season pitching shutouts (8)

As a result of such a successful season, post-season awards were plentiful. Caleb Brickner, Jaxon Kostka, Matt McCann, and Paul Petit were named to the 1st Team All-Conference, Alex Rocksvold and Cody Osborn were named to the 2nd Team All-Conference, and Matthew Hellman was named Honorable Mention All-Conference. In addition, Caleb Brickner and Jaxon Kostka were named to the 1st Team All-District by the Wisconsin Baseball Coaches Association (WBCA), and Matt McCann, Cody Osborn, and Paul Petit were named to the 2nd Team All-District by the WBCA. Paul Petit, Caleb Brickner, Matt McCann, Cody Osborn, and Jaxon Kostka were also all recognized as All-Academic Team for District III of the WBCA.

Paul Petit was selected to play in the WBCA Senior All-Star Classic held in Oshkosh on June 23 and 24. Paul is only the fourth Rambler to play in the game, joining Regis alums Darin Blang (1987), Isaac Hunter (2010), and Richie Misischia (2015).

Despite an unexpectedly early and tough exit from the WIAA playoffs, the 2017 Rambler Nine truly had an awesome campaign, one that will be fondly recalled for many years to come.




GIRLS SOCCER

The Blues Hall of Fame and Museum in Memphis, Tennessee has opened an exhibit highlighting the career of **Mike Kappus** '**68** and his company, The Rosebud Agency.

Kappus founded The Rosebud Agency in 1976. In spite of maintaining a policy of staying small and focused on the needs of musicians, over its 38-year history, Rosebud's artists earned 116 Grammy nominations and 28 Grammy wins, 9 Rock & Roll Hall of Fame inductions, 7 Grammy Lifetime Achievement or Trustee Awards, and 19 Blues Hall of Fame inductions. Kappus was also inducted into the Blues Hall of Fame in 2014 and honored as Manager / Agent of the Year an unprecedented 4 times.

The exhibit, called "Mike Kappus and The Rosebud Agency: 45+ Years Sharing the Music", will run through the fall of 2017, and possibly through January of 2018. The exhibit features rare memorabilia including tour jackets, promotional items, posters, photos, a selection of tour passes, GRAMMY® nominated and winning CD projects, and many other unique items culled from Kappus' years as a promoter, agent, manager, talent buyer, and GRAMMY® winning producer. Kappus represented 19 Blues Hall of Fame inductees and many more Blues Music Awards Winners, all of whom will be represented in this exhibit. Environmental concerns have always been a priority for Kappus who produced two CDs for Earthjustice, including artists such as Bob Dylan, Tom Waits, Bonnie Raitt, Tina Turner, Willie Nelson, Norah Jones, Los Lobos, Lou Reed, and many more. Mike

is currently working with UNC-Chapel Hill's Southern Folklife Center to archive literally tons of materials from Rosebud including 45,000 contracts for live performances over the years. In addition to consulting for the estates of



Captain Beefheart and JJ Cale as well as music festivals and other nonprofit organizations, Mike currently is a Director on the Boards of the Arhoolie Foundation as well as the Jonathan Logan Fail Foundation which supports non-profits working in the fields of investigative journalism, the arts, and social justice. The Blues Hall of Fame is located at 421 S. Main Street in Memphis, across from the Civil Rights Museum. To learn more, visit blues.org/hall-of-fame-museum.


Regis All Class Reunion


