




McMenomy, and Lorren Postl, were part of a group of 200 pilgrims from the Diocese of La Crosse.

For members of the senior class at Regis High School, choosing a path to follow once they graduate can be a challenging task. For two students in the Class of 2017, the decision was clear. They wanted to serve our country.

"I began seriously considering joining the U.S. Army my sophomore year at Regis High School," said Paul Alexander. "Once I became a junior, I started the process of enlisting with a recruiter. I am interested in participating in Airborne School."

"I'm joining the U.S. Navy as a Logistics Specialist with a specialty in search and rescue," said Ethan Cook. "I have thought about joining the military since I was a kid, but began seriously considering

the idea when the U.S. Navy Blue Angels came to perform in the Chippewa Valley in 2015."

Cook has attended Regis Catholic Schools since preschool, and he is a parishioner at St. James the Greater Parish. Alexander came to Regis Catholic Schools in 6th grade, and is a member of Immaculate Conception Parish.

In just a few short months, the two will begin their journey as members of the U.S. Armed

seriously here. That has helped me push for a special forces rate so I can excel in my field."

For Alexander, it was the Regis Ramblers athletics programs that really helped get him ready.

"I think my time at Regis will help me in the military because of the level of discipline our sports programs have," he said. "I know that will serve me well."

Come this summer, Cook is headed for training in Chicago and Alexander is headed to Fort Benning, Georgia. Until then, they say they will continue to feel good about the decision they've made.

"My family and friends have been very supportive of my decision," added Cook. "My classmates will often stop me in the hallway to ask about the process I'm going through."


The same holds true for the staff at Regis High School.

FRANCIS “BUD” & JUNE HARRINGTON ESTATE GIFT

The Regis Catholic Schools Foundation was blessed to recently receive a large estate gift from Francis “Bud” and June Harrington. The total amount of this gift was \$1,316,780.82.

Bud was a lifelong resident of Eau Claire, and June was born in Minneapolis, Minnesota. They were married in Eau Claire on April 5, 1937. June was a close friend of the late Fr. Edmund Klimek, who was the pastor where she attended church.

June worked at the Northern Wisconsin Colony and Training School, now called the Northern Wisconsin Center for the Developmentally Disabled. Bud ran a used car dealership on Brackett Avenue. The Bartlett-Harrington Dealership was taken over by Wood Motor Company when he retired. They had one daughter, Barbara Harrington Bartelt, a 1956 graduate of Regis High School. Barbara passed away in 1995.

June and Bud were very diligent about saving and investing, and as a result, they were able to accumulate a nice savings account, which was part of their estate given to the Regis Catholic Schools Foundation. Her grandson, Ken Bartelt, says, “June was a child of the depression, which I believe led her to live the way she did. She was frugal with spending and very disciplined with savings.” June told Ken that every time she was paid, she would invest in savings bonds. Bartelt said, “She is certainly an example for young adults that if a person

is disciplined and starts saving at an early age, quite a large sum of money can be accumulated.”

The couple’s hobbies included dancing to the Big Bands of that era, gardening, playing cards, and June was known to be a well-read and avid reader. Bud was an avid golfer, and June also enjoyed inline skating. She was highlighted in a Leader-Telegram article about her inline skating at the age of 79 at Moulton’s Skate America in 1997.



The Francis “Bud” and June Harrington endowed scholarship will be established to be given to Regis students on an annual basis. The first scholarship will be presented beginning this year. The funds will also help assist families who need financial assistance to be able to afford a Regis Catholic Schools education at Regis High School.



Bill Uelmen, the Regis Catholic Schools Advancement Director who worked with the Harrington estate, said, “The estate gift from Bud and June Harrington is one of the larger planned gifts the Regis Catholic Schools Foundation has received. This generous planned gift will help ensure current and future students are able to get a quality Regis Catholic Schools education.”

Bud and June Harrington will be included in the Regis Legacy Society, which recognizes those generous donors whose legacy will live on through their planned gifts to the Regis Catholic Schools Foundation.




CATHOLIC SCHOOLS WEEK



Regis students participated in the 11th Annual Lego Robotics Competition in December in Rochester, Minnesota.

The Lego Robotics Program is sponsored by IBM and at least one Regis team has competed since the program began. This year, there were 460 students from 150 teams competing across three divisions.

Students spend several months building and programming their Lego robots to solve weekly problems. Their work is capped off each year by a competition where students demonstrate the program they wrote to solve a long-term problem. At the competition, students are given a short-term project which requires teams to solve a problem from start to finish during a set amount of time. After building, programming, and testing their robot, students demonstrate their team's solution for the judges or compete head-to-head with other teams.
