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



Legacy and Tradition: Why Does Regis Matter?

From the Dean

of the Rambler Report, there are many pieces about the athletic accomplishments from the 2022-

2023 school year. Regis has had a long tradition of striving for excellence in athletics. This success also comes with a price, creating for some a presumption that the only thing Regis cares about is athletics. Given the media saturation of high school athletics, I can understand how this presumption is made. Nevertheless, when looking at the legacy and tradition of Regis, one word stands out: Excellence. Yes, excellence in athletics for sure, but also excellence in academics and faith.

The roots of this legacy and tradition go back to the late Bishop John Paul. Bishop Paul, or Father Paul when he was at Regis, embodied excellence in faith, academics, and co-curricular activity. His combination of a brilliant intellect, an accomplished athlete and coach with a priestly zeal that led him to eventually become Bishop of our Diocese is rare. Former Athletic Director Terry Allen gifted me a

picture of Fr. Paul that has hung on every wall of every rectory I have lived. In this image, Bishop Paul is running a football practice at Carson Park. When I look at "Assistant Coach Paul" I'm reminded not only of Fr. Paul but of the same foundations of excellence he instilled in Regis.

At the time when Regis was built, there were deep religious divisions not only between Catholics and Non-Catholics but also between city parishes. As many of you know, Regis was born from St. Patrick High School. Given the tension between Irish and German immigrants, it was often joked that St. Patrick and Sacred Heart Parishes had better relations with Lutheran Parishes than they did with each other - and even the relationship with Lutherans was strained. When Regis was built, Fr. Paul set a goal to improve relationships between Catholic parishes in town. This is why the new high school had three names in the first three years of its existence: St. Patrick High School, St. Patrick Central High School, and then Regis High School.

Why did this name progression occur? Parishioners from the other Catholic Parishes in town felt that St. Patrick had way too much influence on the high school. Therefore, one of the

first principles of the new central high school was developed: Regis would not have a direct relationship with one parish but would seek to involve all the parishes equally.

This idea of a central high school not only played a role in trying to unify parish divisions but also city divisions. In an era where tensions ran high between Catholics and Non-Catholics, Fr. Paul desired Regis to be a place where both Catholics and Non-Catholics would strive for excellence together.


One of the ways Fr. Paul would accomplish this was by bringing his unique skill set to community events. One of my favorite Fr. Paul stories came from Regis alumni Jim Garvey. He would blissfully talk about how Fr. Paul would play in Chamber of Commerce baseball games. As the

legendary story goes, Truman
Farr, a reserve tackle for the
Wisconsin Badger Football team,
was home for the summer and
was playing on a team opposite
from Fr. Paul. Fr. Paul was playing
third base and, on two occasions,
Truman Farr came barreling
in on a close play at third and
tried to lay out Fr. Paul. The only
problem was that it was Truman
Farr that got laid out... twice.
Now, some may question if the

story of a future Bishop laying out a Wisconsin Badger during a baseball game would be a good example of ecumenism. Fair point. However, it was moments like this that started to break down barriers between Catholics and Non-Catholics in the city of Eau Claire and fostered an attitude of trust with non-Catholics who desired a private school education for the children at Regis. Fr. Paul was not only a "Catholic figure", but a city leader who sought to bring the city, regardless of faith, together.

Striving for excellence in faith, academics, and co-curricular activities. Fostering a sense of unity between Catholics, Non-Catholics, and the city of Eau Claire as a whole. These are all essential foundations of Regis Catholic Schools. And these are the foundations that I, as Dean, strive to continue to build upon for our school community.

At Regis, we are strategic in collecting data to help us understand if we are achieving our Mission Statement and Core Values. This information is based on surveys from seniors upon graduation, then again with follow-up surveys two years after graduation, and then again five years after graduation. It is important to get feedback from the very students who attended our schools to sample how a Regis Catholic Schools education has impacted their lives.

Recently, the five-year follow-up results from the Regis High School Class of 2017 indicate several areas of significance.

- 88.8% Regarded Regis High School Coursework as Challenging
- 80.1% Confirmed Completion of a Postsecondary Degree
- 89.2% Stated Regis had Properly Prepared Them for the 'Next Step in Life'
- 83.2% Are Working Full Time With Another 10.3% Still Working on Graduate Degrees
- 100% Responded 'Yes' When Asked 'Are You Grateful to Have Attended Regis?'



Many of you, like myself, are alumni and can be very proud of the results submitted by the Class of 2017. For those of you who currently have a student or students in our schools, please know our commitment to your children and their future is our focus every day. The results indicated hail the value of Catholic education and reinforce what a wonderful gift it is when parents make the choice to give their children a Regis Catholic Schools education. I personally do not believe there is any item on the planet that could be purchased and be more impactful for your child's future than a Catholic education.

It takes dedicated staff, committed administration, devoted pastoral care, and parish support by all of the supporting churches of Eau Claire Deanery to provide this level of excellence. hroughout history, Regis High School and St. Patrick's High School have been home to countless student-athletes who have demonstrated what it means to be a Rambler.



All it takes is one look at our Regis Hall of Fame display to be reminded of the names and faces we remember long after graduation.

The Regis High School Class of 2023 is no exception, with many of our soon-to-be graduates making an impact in athletics and academics.

Cole Selvig and Zander Rockow are among this distinguished group, having both committed to continuing their athletic and academic career at NCAA Division 1 (D1) schools this fall. Selvig has committed to playing baseball at The University of Texas at Austin and Rockow has committed to playing football at the University of Minnesota.

HITTING IT OUT OF THE PARK

Cole Selvig has been a Rambler for his entire schooling career, having started in kindergarten at Immaculate Conception Elementary School. He says his parents felt it was very important for him to receive a Catholic education and says over the years, he has leaned heavily on his faith.

"Having prayer and Mass on a weekly basis at Regis let me further my faith and religious life," Selvig said. "Regis offered a great environment to support my family's values."

Selvig has been a fixture on the baseball diamond for many years, with Regis Baseball Head Coach Andy Niese recalling his natural talent from the start.

"I distinctly remember watching Cole as a 5th grader pitch at our youth baseball camp," Niese said. "It was

apparent he had a promising skill set. Cole has been so successful because he is an exceptionally talented pitcher who possesses an extreme amount of arm strength, combined with an unusually intense inner drive to make himself as good as he can be."

Those natural skills and drive to succeed helped launch Selvig into several athletic opportunities, including playing for the GRB Academy out of Madison for five years. He has also played on the Cincinnati Reds Scout Team, the Perfect Game

the state championship with my best friends during my junior year."

Coach Niese says he will never forget Selvig's impact on the team.

"The last time Regis had a D1 college baseball player was more than 30 years ago in the late 1980s," Niese said. "Every person in our program – whether they know it or not – benefits on numerous levels just from being around a player of Selvig's caliber. He is a focused, driven, and attentive young man who is easily one of the most competitive people I will ever coach."

Selvig says he knew during his freshman year that he had a real chance to play baseball at the next level and dedicated himself to the game and getting better every day.

"I knew if I wanted to play college baseball it would take a lot of work, so I made baseball my main focus and put my head down and went to work," Selvig said.

That work not only happened on the field but in the classroom, too.

"The academic opportunities at Regis High School are great," he said. "Balancing school and sports has never been an issue for me because I know if I don't handle my business in the classroom, I won't be playing baseball."

When it came to deciding where he'd next take his talent, Selvig says the history of success, strong coaching staff, and high-quality facilities made The University of Texas at Austin an easy choice.

"I feel anxious and ready to make this big jump to play at the next level. I feel like I am as prepared as I can be and have no regrets," Selvig said.

What he does have are plenty of memories and a heart full of gratitude for his time as a Rambler.

"I'd like to say thank you to all of my teachers and staff who have had a positive impact on my learning experience at Regis," Selvig said. "I am very thankful for my friends who have supported me throughout my journey. I am grateful to my parents for making the choice to send me to Regis. I couldn't have asked for a better way to spend my years of schooling."

As he prepares to graduate, Selvig has some advice for those coming up behind him at Regis High School.

"Grades come first. Work as hard as you can. Don't compare yourself to others. Focus on yourself and be great."

"I decided to make football my main focus going on to the collegiate level because of my love and passion for the game," Rockow said. "It is extremely fun for


me to fly around and make plays."



Hockey

It was a tough start to the season for the RAM Hockey team thanks to countless injuries and illness. The team ended the first half of the season with a record of 4-7-0. During the second half of the season, the student-athletes started to get healthy and went 8-2-0 in the last ten games of the regular season (10-3-0 including playoffs).

The team ended with an overall record of 14-10-0, the best in RAM history, and finished 3rd in the conference with a 6-4-0 conference record. The team also enjoyed a five game win streak, the longest in RAM history, and went 9 games (8-1-0) without losing in regulation. (The only loss during that streak was in overtime.)









Wrestling

After months of hard work with weeks of Saturday tournaments and Tuesday/Thursday dual meets, the Regis-Altoona Wrestling team was grateful for a successful 2022-23 season. The wrestlers ended on a high note with numerous wins as individuals as well as a team.

The RAW team placed in the top seven of every tournament entered and took 1st in two of them. The team also placed 2nd in the duel meet conference standing and 2nd in the conference tournament, as well as 3rd in the (inaugural) super regional tournament.

The RAW team had four individuals who reached their 100th high school career win. Seniors Caden Weber (Regis), Tommy Tomesh (Altoona), Deaglan O'Connell (Altoona), and Junior Brayden Albee (Regis). This is a huge achievement especially with having a COVID year in which they only got a few matches.

Overall, the team had an outstanding season with six wrestlers qualifying for sectionals and five of them advancing to the state tournament in Madison. The wrestlers had a strong showing at the state tournament and Caden Weber placed 3rd in the 195 lb. weight bracket. We are so proud of our entire team and look forward to another great season next year!
