

Bishop Battersby: A Missionary of Hope

ReportFrom the Dean

There are three ways we can understand a person: How do they understand themselves, how do others

perceive them, and who has God made and called them to be. These categories can be applied to anyone, but those called to leadership often face the scrutiny of these categories more than others. To embrace a role as a public figure in society is often compared metaphorically to living in a "fishbowl." When one swims in those waters, the assessment of what others perceive someone to be often becomes amplified. Of the many positions in both the Catholic Church and civic society that are most impacted by this fishbowl, it is the Church's hierarchy.

Bishop Battersby is the newest fish in that bowl as Bishop of the Diocese of La Crosse. Coming to us from Lion Country, the city of Detroit, there is a question being asked of him by many that has nothing to do with his feelings about the Green Bay Packers - Who is this man?

Far more eloquent biographical summaries exist online about his past you can look up so I will spare you the basics. Instead, I want to share my initial impressions working with this new Bishop as a Priest and the Dean for the Eau Claire Deanery.

First, he is a disciple of Jesus Christ, called to shepherd us as an apostle. Some may think this a rather bland assessment of a Bishop. After all, isn't this what all Bishops are to be? Yes, but from the perspective of a Priest, some of the questions I have of a Bishop are as follows: Does this man want me to work for him, work with him, or minister and administer the Gospel of Christ as sojourners of faith?

If you have spent any time with Bishop Battersby, it is clear that he IS a disciple. He HAS an apostle's heart. He WANTS us to walk together with him in Christ. Saying nothing ill-willed about our previous Bishops, I have never met a Bishop as attuned to the Holy Spirit as Bishop Battersby. In short, we HAVE a follower and lover of Jesus Christ as our Bishop.

Second, he is a man of patience and discernment. For those who have worked with me and know me well, you know that I like to have fun and be light-hearted, but when serious things arise I can get a little fiery under the sacerdotal collar. I am happy to report that Bishop Battersby is fiery in a different way! He is a man of calm, patience, discernment, and a steady hand. He is a man who administrates from prayer and allows Christ to be the calm in an administrative storm even when some of his Deans churn the waters. In short, he leads with prayer, he listens deeply not only to those he speaks to, but the God he loves.

Lastly, he is a man of hope. Sometimes we choose a path set before us and other times God invites us to embrace an unforeseen path that challenges us, calling forth particular gifts for a particular time and particular reasons. Bishop Battersby comes to us at a time when the Holy Spirit inspired Pope Francis to declare a Jubilee Year of Hope. Bishop Battersby did not choose this theme, but his arrival to the Diocese calls him to be a Bishop of Hope. There are many things I could cite that give me the confidence that Bishop Battersby is a Missionary of Hope for the Diocese of La Crosse, but I will summarize those thoughts with one, clear assessment: Bishop Battersby will not allow us to turn to him as our hope, but demand that all of us, himself included, embrace Jesus Christ who is our Hope.

To summarize this reflection in true "Fr. James Speak": Fasten your seat belts! We have a Bishop who is giving the wheel to the Holy Spirit. And may God inspire Bishop Battersby and all of us to be Missionaries of Hope, Missionaries of Faith, and Missionaries of Love.

Regis students help pack meals to help local families, food pantries face food insecurity

As students gathered into Regis' gymnasium, more and more boxes were piled up on the walls that contained food to help against food insecurity in the Eau Claire community.

The service project at Regis was a part of the schools celebration of Catholic Schools Week. Additionally, the opportunity was a way to serve the community and help families and community members who may struggle with affording meals among other expenses.

Regis Principal Bill Giese said, "We see this as a way to work towards fixing that problem, and it gives the kids hands-on experience with serving others which is what our whole Catholic mission is."

The school collaborated with US Hunger, a non-profit organization that helps get food to families in need and organizes meal packing events like the one at Regis. In total, middle and high school students throughout the day managed to package nearly 20,736 meals.

"The school had done this in years past, but it had been awhile," said Giese. "We brought it back this year as a way to serve others. We also asked for donations from part of our families, because it does cost quite a bit to buy all of this food and the materials, but families donated and we had it covered pretty easily. It says a lot about our Regis community."

With another decision made by the school, the student council decided that their impact would be beneficial in supporting the local community. Therefore, all the food packaged on Tuesday would be going towards local food banks as a means to support local families who seek support through these services. Grades took turns filling up food bags in the gymnasium, with 11th and 12th graders starting the school-wide effort in the morning.

"One in eight families suffer

from food insecurity, not knowing if they can afford to put a healthy meal on the table... or if they need that money for health or any other problems they are facing," said Tony Wesner, a high schooler at Regis.

"It is really important for us, because it is part of the Catholic faith to help other people out..." said Dominic Santine, a fellow high schooler at Regis. "And if you are going to do this with your friends, it is really fun too. It is important, and I am just happy to know that we are helping people while we are doing this."

With more work packaging meal bags following their time spent in the gymnasium, Santine said he hopes their involvement in the service project will inspire younger grades. On top of that, both Santine and Wesner said their hope is for the work done throughout the day to impact the community as well.

"It is all about the small things that can lead to big things," said Santine. "And that is exactly what this is: something small that will have big impacts on the community."

Girls Basketball

The Lady Ramblers finished the 2024-25 season with a 19-7 record. The team was led by a group of five seniors: Carly Borst, Abby Hawker, Malia Kassing, Jace Jensen, and Cara Olson. The Ramblers battled through a tough schedule early on, which was built on a tremendous amount of competition. This schedule prepared the student-athletes for the tough conference schedule in which they finished the conference season as co-champions with a 10-2 record and the first conference title since 2019.

On the floor, the Ramblers were led by fellow All-Conference First Team performers in Carly Borst and EllaMay Cooper. Izzy Reichert was named to the All-Conference Second Team and Malia Kassing earned Honorable Mention. EllaMay Cooper was unanimously voted as the Conference Player of the Year as a sophomore. EllaMay scored her 1,000th career point on February 25 in the first round playoff game vs. Unity. She also set a school record 44 points vs. Steven's Point on February 13.

The Lady Ramblers then opened the playoffs as a surprisingly low 6-seed. The team instantly took down Unity 82-35 behind 35 points from EllaMay Cooper and 32 points from Carly Borst. However, after splitting with Fall Creek during the regular season, the Ramblers would fall to Fall Creek 57-63 in the regional semi-final.



Hockey

Overall Record: 17-6 Middle Border Conference Record: 5-4

The 2024-25 RAM Hockey team was made up of 30 student-athletes from Regis (2), Altoona (21), McDonell (3), and Fall Creek (4). The team returned everyone from last year's team except one senior and added 11 freshmen this season. The team had three seniors, nine juniors, seven sophomores, and 11 freshmen. The coaching staff was led by Head Coach Travis Obrycki and Assistant Coaches Marty Hickey (JV Head Coach) and Mick Podruch. The team started the season out hot with a trip to the east side of the state where the student-athletes played in the holiday invite at Ozaukee Ice Arena and defeated both Homestead and Cedarburg. The team would continue to win with nine straight victories until losing in overtime against Mound Westonka in the championship game at the River Bend Holiday Classic in Red Wing, Minnesota. This run saw RAM ranked as high as number 3 in the state at Division 2, boasting the highest powerplay percentage (40.4%) and ending the season with the 3rd most points. The season ended in the second round of the section 3 playoffs versus state-ranked (5) River Falls.



Wrestling

The Regis/Altoona (RAW) Boys and Girls Wrestling team had a season of growth. This year, the team graduated three seniors. A large freshman group of 13 included the first female wrestlers for the team. The team was young, but had a lot of heart, determination, and a bright future.

Five boys and two girls qualified for the Division I sectional tournament. (Cillian O'Connell, Drey Kren, Jacob Lootans, Jack Wesner, Malachai Zelms, Jaelyn Bowe & Cassidy O'Connell) None of the boys made it to state, but the girls closed out the season competing at state, with Jaelyn Bowe just missing podium and Cassidy O'Connell bringing home some hardware. This marks the first female RAW wrestlers to compete at state and first to place. Another momentous event was junior Jack Wesner clinching his 100th win mid-season.

Overall, the team had a successful season, taking 3rd in the Cloverbelt Conference tournament and 3rd in the overall conference standings. Good luck to graduating seniors Mason, Nash, and Greg. We wish them the best and hope wrestling has helped prepare them for life's adversity. We know our returning wrestlers will rise to the occasion of putting in the work needed for the next season.




Boys Basketball

The Regis Ramblers Boys Basketball team had an impressive season, finishing with the most wins since 2016 at a 19-7 overall record. The team secured a 2nd place finish in the Cloverbelt Conference. The Ramblers received an overall 2 seed in their region for playoffs and a first-round bye. The team beat Neilsville in the second round of playoffs before falling to Onalaska Luther in the Regional Final in a back and forth game 67-70.

The Ramblers were led this year in scoring by junior Blake Risler (21.5 ppg), senior Owen Weisenberger (15.6 ppg), and Freshman DJ Cooper (10.6 ppg). These three also received impressive honors for their play during the season. DJ Cooper received 2nd Team All-Conference honors while Blake and Owen received 1st Team All-Conference honors. Blake was recognized for his outstanding play by being named the Cloverbelt Conference Player of the Year. Owen and Blake both reached an impressive milestone for their careers, surpassing 1,000 points scored. The Ramblers' five seniors, Owen Weisenberger, Noah Tarras, David Ricciardi, Andrew Bershback, and Harrison Haas, all played a crucial role and helped lead the team to success. Sophomore Joey Brahmer also played a big role in contributing this year.

Regis put together a season full of exciting victories, tough defensive battles, and high-energy performances that made them one of the top teams in the area. Though their playoff run ended earlier than hoped, the Ramblers' impressive season sets a strong foundation for future success.


