



From the Dean

I've come to learn a lot about how important the next few years are for our graduates.

Small Decisions with Big Implications

This edition of the Rambler Report focuses on graduation. Graduation is an exciting time for students, parents, family, and friends. There is the rich emotional tapestry of looking back, looking forward, finishing a chapter of life, starting a new chapter, understanding who we've become, and embarking on what we will be in the future.

From my experience as a high school Chaplain and Pastor of two Newman Centers at the university level, I've come to learn a lot about how important the next few years are for our graduates. However, the most important decisions are not what you may think.

If you are a parent or a Regis graduate, you have spent a lot of time considering things like which college you will attend, what your major should be, whether should you take some time off from school to enter the workforce, and so forth. Now, these are important decisions. These are the "big decisions" you need to make. However, I would like to ask you, have you given thought to the "small decisions" that are ahead of you?

What are the small decisions? If you or your graduate is going to college, they will be inundated with "Freshman Freebies." Whether it be fraternities, sororities, various student organizations, or credit card companies coaxing youth to fill out applications in exchange for free bags of peanut butter M&M's, campuses have a strong "culture of contact" for incoming freshmen. An important question to explore is why this in-your-face welcome is so universal.

The reason is that statistics show college students meet 80% of their closest friends through college in the first 72 hours from when they move onto campus. When you think about it, this period is rarely on anyone's radar screen when going to college. They're three days of "small decisions" and unpacking that have little to do with your degree and the reasons why you chose the college you will attend. Yet, when we think about it, these 72 hours are far more influential than we realize.

I encourage all our graduates to pray with this question: How will I spend the first 72 hours of my time on campus? Will you simply wait for an organization to put a schedule in your hand along with a half-melted freeze stick or will you actively seek out the people and organizations you want to be a part of? And will you seek out how your place of education will accommodate or not accommodate your faith life? Research the faith resources of the campus you will be attending, visit the campus ministries, and find out when Mass will be held. Risk signing up for a student supper, bible study, or retreat.

These are questions that rarely make the "big decision" phase of transitioning to college. Yet, these "small decisions" may have a much greater impact on your future than a degree and the school that degree comes from. These "small decisions" will be foundational to becoming who we will be in the future. They will set that stage of how and who we will face our futures with as we embrace becoming who God has made us to be.

Seyer has a long history of involvement with Regis Catholic Schools and high school athletics. He participated in football, basketball, and tennis during his time as a student at Regis High School and has served as the head boys and girls tennis coach for the Ramblers since 2012.

"Regis has been a major part of my life and my family's life," Seyer said. "This opportunity feels full circle and allows me the opportunity to give back to a place that has given me so much!"

Over the years, Seyer has led the Regis Tennis program to great success. Under his direction, the girls tennis program has achieved a 209-73 overall record with state tournament appearances in 2012, 2013, 2014, 2016, 2017, 2019, 2020, and 2021. The girls tennis program finished as state runner-up in 2016 and 2021. Seyer has led the boys tennis program to a 125-36 overall record with state tournament appearances in 2013, 2014, and 2015. Under Seyer's direction, the boys tennis program has also won 14 straight conference championships.

Seyer has served on the WIAA State Tennis Advisory
Committee and the WIAA State Seeding Committee
and has assisted in various roles with the Regis Football
and Regis Basketball programs as well. Seyer has
worked as an outside salesman since his graduation
from UW-Eau Claire.

"I am humbled and honored by the opportunity to lead the Regis athletic programs," Seyer said. "I look forward to helping guide our programs and partnering with our coaches and studentathletes as we all carry on our strong Rambler tradition!"







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I journeyed with Father Tom and 46 other amazing pilgrims to the Holy Land and it was truly an experience I will never forget.

ow many people can say they walked on Holy Ground... or they walked where Jesus once walked? I can finally say that I did! It was an incredibly emotional journey, but one that changes you as a Christian in the most spiritual and best way. It has brought a whole new meaning to the scripture readings that you hear each day. It brought them to life!

During this pilgrimage, we walked in the footsteps of Jesus, yes, but we also walked in the footsteps of his Mother Mary, and of his Apostles. Amazing! As I share my journey, remember, it's walking where Jesus walked. I still have a hard time believing it to this day. Oh, and I forgot to mention, we celebrated the Mass at a new Holy site each day!

Our journey to the Holy Land started off a bit rough as we all got thrown

a few curveballs at the airport. I truly think that was an experience that helped us form the close bonds that we did. When we arrived, we made our way to Tiberias on the Sea of Galilee and after a great night's rest, we were off on an adventure to our first Holy Sites.

We stopped in Cana where we attended a service in the chapel of St. Simon the Canaanite. In this beautiful chapel, the renewal of wedding vows occurred along with blessings over spouses who have died and all received the laying of hands (can't even grasp my feelings of that moment). It was a very special moment for those married and for those who aren't. We then journeyed to Nazareth and went to Mount Precipice. Mount Precipice looks over Nazareth, Mt. Tabor, and the Yizrael Valley. This site is also known as The

Leaping Mountain, or where an angry mob attempted to push Jesus off the cliff after he said he was the Messiah.. and walked away. We then journeyed to Nazareth and visited the Basilica of the Annunciation, where the angel appeared to the Virgin Mary to announce that she will be the Mother of Jesus. We toured Joseph's church. We also visited the grotto of Mary's home where Gabriel appeared to her We then celebrated the Mass in the upper chapel, our first Mass on Holy Ground, a Mass that will always be close in my heart. We finished the night by dipping our feet into the Sea of Galilee...or if you are Father Tom, you take a swim!

Our pilgrimage continued the next day when we headed to Capernaum, known as the Town of Jesus...walking where Jesus walked...truly. While in Capernaum, we were able to sit in

the remains of the synagogue where Jesus' ministry took place. We then went to The Church of St. Peter (where we celebrated the Mass) which is above the House of Peter. While in the Church, you can observe Peter's house right below your feet through a glass floor. We broke bread in memory of Jesus. We then traveled to Capernaum's Greek Orthodox Church of the 12 Apostles where we saw walls of beautiful icons telling us the life of Christ. We then walked to the top of Mount Arbel, overlooking the Sea of Galilee... beautiful sites every way you looked.

The next day, we woke up to a beautiful sunrise and traveled to Tabgha to see inside the Church of the Multiplication where we saw an ancient mosaic of the loaves and fishes. We celebrated the Mass on the shore near that church...a very windy/rainy but amazing Mass outside, one we will never forget. Why? Because we

had the high waves and the wind in our faces. We then visited the Mount of the Beatitudes where Father read the Sermon on the Mount. That is the moment I really understood the Sermon on the Mount...being there changed that scripture reading for me in the best way. We then journeyed to the Church of Peter's Primacy where Peter was told "Feed my lambs, feed my sheep". This is where Jesus cared for his disciples after he was risen. We then visited Eremos

Cave where Jesus went to pray alone and finished our day seeing a 1st century boat that was recovered 35 years ago!

Our pilgrimage continued the next day as we journeyed from Galilee to Judea. On the way, we had Mass at the Church of the Transfiguration on Mt. Tabor. This experience was surreal because a cloud came over us just like it came over Jesus at his Transfiguration...a beautiful thing. Then we left Tabor and headed for Jericho. In Jericho, we walked and saw the Mount of Temptation Monastery, the site where Jesus was being tempted by the Devil. We then went and enjoyed some pomegranate juice, I wore a pomelo peel on my head as a hat, and ended with getting a kiss from a camel. Then, like Mary and Joseph, we traveled to stay the night in Bethlehem.

While we were in Bethlehem, we went to the Church of the Nativity which stands on the site where Jesus was born. Before entering there, we stopped at The Milk Grotto of our Virgin Mary, a place where Mary nursed Jesus...an icon that I have never seen before. We experienced going through the Door of Humility which led us into the Church of the Nativity. This door is called the "Door of Humility" because humility is a part of our relationship with God. God lifts us up, even at our lowest times. We then took a trip to the L'Arche Community, an organization that is near and dear to Father Tom. It is a community where people both with and without intellectual disabilities are living,

working, and praying together. They create beautiful things that they love to sell! Later that day, we walked to the West Bank barrier wall that separates Israel from Palestinians...an emotional thing to see and to experience. It cuts off the town of Bethlehem from the rest of Israel. On the Palestinian side, it is graffitied all the way around expressing different messages and used as a big canvas.

We then journeyed from Bethlehem to Jerusalem. On our journey, we stopped at Shepherds Field where the angel appeared with Good News of Great Joy to the shepherds. There, we celebrated the Mass. We visited the only Catholic University, "Bethlehem University," where we listened to students talk and share about their experiences at the University...traveling from Jerusalem to Bethlehem isn't an easy journey by any means. Because of the divide, they spend hours mornings and nights at

checkpoints, just to come to school. We then went to the St. Joseph Syriac Catholic Church. Then we made our way to the Old City of Jerusalem where we explored numerous shops and other sites along the way! Nothing like walking the streets of Jerusalem during the night...can you believe it!

Being in Jerusalem, we set out for our next destination. We went to Pater Noster Church, with the Lord's

Prayer in many different languages that is at the top of Mt. Olives and made our way down to the Garden of Gethsemane. We walked the route that was walked on Palm Sunday. We got to see Gethsemane's olive trees and went to the Church of All Nations/Basilica of Agony where we attended Mass around the Rock of Agony...where Jesus prayed in agony the night before his crucifixion. We then walked to the Upper Room of the Last Supper and then went to St. Peter in Gallicantu and walked down to pray in the sacred pit...where Jesus was confined the night before he died. That night, we witnessed the Jewish people worshiping at the Western Wall.

This part of our pilgrimage was a true moment of stopping and taking in the sorrow and pain of Jesus. At 5 a.m. we retraced the last steps of Jesus...we walked along the Via Dolorosa, or the Way of the Cross, through the closed markets of the Old City of Jerusalem praying the Stations of the Cross...taking time to reflect on his sacrifice. We then arrived at the Church of the Holy Sepulchre for Mass with the Tomb of Christ as our Altar. After Mass, we took time to really be present at the Tomb of Christ, and still today, I can't express to anyone my feelings and emotions when seeing and being present at the Tomb of Christ. We then went to Emmaus where the Lord was known in the Breaking of the Bread and saw some ancient Jewish Tombs. Back in Jerusalem, we visited the old Pools Of Bethesda and then ended with a visit to St. Anne's



Basilica, the birthplace of Our Lady.

We then journeyed to the Dome of the Rock, a very holy site for Muslims. All are able to visit, but not all can go in the mosques. Modesty is important! We then traveled the roads of Jerusalem to the Western Wall, which is the holiest place for those of Jewish Faith and the last remaining outer wall of the ancient Jewish Temple. This is a place where the people pray and whisper their wishes to the wall. We then had Sunday Mass at Good Shepherd Church. We then entered the City of David and took an unbelievably amazing walk through King Hezekiah's tunnel! Nothing like walking through a dark tunnel knee deep in water!

Our last few days were spent in Jordan staying right on the Dead Sea. We visited Jordan's three holiest sites. We renewed our Baptismal promises at the East Bank of the Jordan River and the site of Jesus' Baptism. We even got to walk in the waters of the Jordan River! We had Mass at Mount Nebo, where Moses saw the Promised Land before his death. And then we went to Mukawir/Machaerus. This was where John the Baptist was imprisoned and beheaded. On our second day in Jordan, we went North to Anjara. This is where Our Lady of the Mount is and where we attended Mass. In 2010, the ancient image of Our Lady of the Mount shed tears of blood. We then visited some kids who were in the orphanage right next door. Our last

day in Jordan, we went to Petra, a city of stone. Here is where we spent our day walking the stone city, seeing the Treasury (carved into the Petra sandstone by the Nabataens), rode camels, learned about the 600 tombs that are there, and just took in this ancient site! We then journeyed back to Amman and floated in the Dead Sea... literally floated. We finished our journey with a whole group dinner (and many had to stay an extra day, but that's a whole other story)!

I can tell you all about the places I traveled as I walked on Holy Ground, but you really can't express the spiritual and emotional piece of it. Walking where Jesus walked is something that will always be a part of me. It is something that has brought me closer to my faith, but really, closer to Jesus. To be places that He once was, you can't ever explain...you just have to be present. I cherish this trip and I am beyond grateful that I was able to experience it. We always read the scriptures, but to experience it, it is a whole new feeling. The best part of it all is that I can share (my) experiences with any and all students that I have... that is a true blessing in itself!

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
