### **REPORT** FROM THE DEAN

Lenten greetings to you all! I pray that this special season of repentance and renewal is bearing fruit in your life.

I am deeply inspired at how seriously our students approach Lent – as seen in their devotion at Stations of the Cross, their eagerness to give to the poor, and their willingness to make challenging personal sacrifices. I especially love the opportunity we priests have to hear the Confessions of hundreds of students. At every grade level, we encounter students with a deep desire to love God with all their heart by rising again each time they fall.

During my many years of Catholic education, Lent was always a meaningful season – something we could all connect with; the ashes on our heads, the meatless Fridays, Stations of the Cross, giving something up.

On a more lighthearted note, there was my sophomore year back in 1992, when I casually said I was giving up television for Lent. These days it would be an effortless sacrifice for me. Even back then, it was not difficult – at first. Then came March Madness. My NCAA basketball picks were consistently winning. All I needed was a Kentucky upset over Duke. In my urge to follow the game, I quickly turned into a legalistic Pharisee. In my teenage mind, I told myself that I could still observe my Lenten discipline by turning my back to the TV and making my little brother call the play-by-play. He grew tired of his job, and my guilt eventually caught up with me.

Then, of course, Christian Laettner had to make a last second shot to win the game for Duke.

In my teenage Pharisee mind, I also wondered if the game was lost because of me not keeping my discipline well enough. I have since learned a great deal, both intellectually and personally, about God's unchanging mercy! Our Lenten observances are not a matter of us trying to be "good enough" to earn His love.

I have gotten to know several of our teachers well during these past six years. I am thrilled with the quality of Catholic education and Faith formation that we are now giving our students. The message I hear consistently imparted is neither lax nor legalistic. Rather, we are consistently challenging students with the loftiest vision of Christian love while gently affirming their identity as beloved sons and daughters of God, who loves them no matter what.

As we approach Easter and the celebration of the core of our Faith, the Paschal Mystery, may we all be renewed in the love and mercy of the Risen Christ!

## **REPORT** FROM THE PRESIDENT

#### Greetings!

With the end of another school year quickly approaching, the staff here at the Regis Catholic Schools Central Office and I are fiscally preparing for the 2018-19 academic year. I will admit that making projections at this time is purely speculative because it depends on so many factors. The 2018-19 tuition rates that the RCS Finance Council established and the Diocese of La Crosse approved are published. Now we have to project staff salaries, predict the enrollment trend, and decide on any capital improvements. I bring this up because we are in the process of refining how we will build the budget in future years.

Controller Kelly Hughes has been with us for more than two years and has made assessments to put a more strategic way of planning in place. She recently participated in a class that helped her adopt a model that projects ten years into the future, showing us the revenue it will take to operate our schools. Looking at the concept of supply and demand, we know we need to be "price sensitive", meaning if tuition is raised too drastically, enrollment will drop. Regis Catholic Schools experienced this in the early 2000s.

One way to prevent drastic increases in tuition is to develop a more assertive campaign to invite more families to experience a Regis Catholic Schools education. Projections tell us the birth and baptismal rates are declining slightly. With this in mind, our pastors approved a letter that was sent to all our parish families who have children currently enrolled in public schools to extend a one-year tuition discount to experience our schools. We have also identified underserved demographics of the area's population. With so many options such as the Wisconsin Parental Choice Program, tuition assistance, and scholarships, we can offer an affordable option to all families who are interested in a faith-based education.

Please pray for our staff as we put forth a more concentrated effort to address the "price sensitive" question as we work to increase enrollment. By our calculations, we can easily add 100 more students system wide in all but one grade without increasing staff. That is a win for all of us, including the new families we pray will decide to join our Regis family.

Thank you for all you do for our schools.

# Accreditation **REPORT**

Regis Catholic Schools has been accredited since 2014 through AdvancED, which is a national organization. Moving forward, we have decided to become accredited through the Wisconsin Religious and Independent Schools (WRISA) as the Diocese of La Crosse has numerous schools that have completed the process through this organization. Since WRISA has local state representatives, it became necessary to follow the lead of the Diocese of La Crosse to complete our most up-to-date accreditation.

Regis Catholic Schools will have an accreditation site visit in November 2019 and we are already beginning to prepare data and evidence through school committees to prepare.

WRISA offers several factors that make sense for our schools. It follows Catholic educational benchmarks, has state assistance when needed, was significantly lower in cost to belong, and offers representation on its State Executive Board through the Diocese of La Crosse. WRISA is a state chapter of the National Federation of Nonpublic School State Accrediting Associations, which is recognized by the College Board and Office of Non-Public Education, an office within the U.S. Department of Education.

There are 73 standards that each of our five schools; Regis High School, Regis Middle School, Immaculate Conception Elementary, St. James Elementary, and St. Mary's Elementary; will complete over the next two years. Committees with representation from each school will collect evidence of these standards. WRISA will then accredit our schools based on substantial compliance with the standards and in terms of its own vision, mission, and core values. Our journey begins by collecting documentation for approval of accreditation and we ask for your prayers as we complete this important task!

# Education Commission **REPORT**

Since I was elected Chair of the Education Commission this past June, I have met several people who are not clear on the exact role of the commission. I would like to take this opportunity to discuss exactly what this group does.

#### Who is on the Education Commission?

The Education Commission is a body made up of the leadership of Regis Catholic Schools, all the clergy in the Eau Claire Deanery, one representative per parish, two student representatives, and one rotating spot given to a teacher in the system.

How are the parish representatives selected?

Priests select parish members they feel would be an asset to the Education Commission. Each parish representative serves a three-year term, and is limited to two terms total.

#### What happens at the meetings?

The Education Commission meets 10 times a year (taking July and December off) and discusses a variety of business, both new and old. This can include items such as the Track & Field of Dreams Project, the accreditation of our system, and reports from sub-committees such as Catholic Identity and Teaching and Learning. The things discussed are items that would affect the system as a whole.

#### So, is it like a school board?

No, we are not like a traditional school board. Whereas a school board votes on things that become policy, the Education Commission is an advisory board. When issues are brought before its members, we use our wide range of life experience to give the leadership of RCS the best advice we can. Occasionally, we will take a vote on something and that becomes our position on that issue. Ultimately, the leadership will decide the final course of action, but not until after listening to what the Education Commission thinks. The parish representatives then often report back to their own parish councils to answer any questions those bodies may have regarding business at Regis Catholic Schools.

### How do I get in touch with someone to bring something up at a meeting?

Initially, you should look at what you want to bring up. If it only affects your child, or your child's class, it should be brought up with the principal and/or your child's teacher. However, if you have an idea or concern that would serve the Regis community as a whole, start by contacting your parish representative. If you do not know who that is, ask your priest. If you live outside the deanery or do not currently belong to a parish, you can contact me at **rsollberger@Regis CatholicSchools.com**. I am always interested in hearing fresh ideas on how to improve our school system.

# FIRST PRODUCTION BY NEW REGIS COMMUNITY

Some people were just meant for the stage. The all new Regis Community Theatre will give members of our Regis Catholic Schools family, and those in the community, a chance to show off their talents!

The new Regis Community Theatre, created and managed by Regis High School teacher Judine Brey, will offer several shows every year, each with a focus on religious themes. While the Regis

Community Theatre will be open to anyone in the Eau Claire community, it will focus on the families, faculty, staff, and alumni at Regis Catholic Schools.

"The Regis Community Theatre will provide more theatrical opportunities for students of all ages," Brey said. "The students at our three elementary schools will have an earlier opportunity to participate in theatrical productions in a setting they are comfortable with, giving them a more complete background when they enter the Regis Middle and High School drama program."

The Regis Community Theatre will produce three shows a year, beginning this summer with *The Miracle Worker* by William Gibson.

"This script allows for a cast covering a broad age-range; children through adults," Brey noted. "Having belonged to casts of this nature, the diversity in age creates a nice family feeling among all the participants, with younger cast members receiving an opportunity to learn from observing and talking to older cast members."

There will be no charge to participate in the Regis Community Theatre and Brey welcomes all participants, no matter the level of experience.

In addition to launching the Regis Community Theatre, Brey is also taking on a new role as Regis' first Fine Arts Director, giving our schools an even greater emphasis on the importance of the arts.

"Because I gained so many things from the fine arts, I am always looking for a way to give back to those activities," Brey said. "I am very excited to

begin this new venture!"

During the school year, the Regis Community Theatre will produce two seasonal shows, a Christmas show in December and a Lent/ Easter show in March/April.

"These productions will allow us, as a faith-based community, to deliver spiritual messages through our performances – something that is done far too little in theatrical circles," Brey said.

Regis Catholic Schools President Mark Gobler says he is excited for the system to add this new opportunity.

"While the Chippewa Valley has developed into a fine cultural center, we at Regis Catholic Schools feel we can fill a niche of presenting family centered, faith-filled plays and performances," Gobler said.

"Under the direction of Ms. Brey, we will include adult members of our parishes,

our students, and alumni to offer community wide productions, which we feel is a wonderful opportunity."

"I ask for your patience and prayers as we head into this new venture for the Regis Catholic Schools fine arts programs. Your support now and in the future is greatly appreciated," added Brey.

# One person cannot do everything.

However, there is a way for all people to have tremendous impact through the power of prayer. Regis High School senior **Lorren Postl lives these words every day**. The 18-year-old has been at Regis Catholic Schools since she started preschool at St. Mary's Elementary. She is a member of St. Olaf Parish and is very involved in faith related activities on the Regis campus, including the Pro-Life Club. She has participated in the Day of Silent Solidarity for the past four years, and attended the March for Life in Washington, D.C. last year.

"God has worked a lot through all of my classes and experiences," Postl said. "I am grateful that I have the opportunity not only to practice my faith at school, but also that I have a good community surrounding me at school which has been very conducive to me growing in my faith."

One of Postl's most visible projects involves the rosary. Three years ago, she began making knotted rosaries as a Catholic Schools Week project for religion class during her freshman year. After just one rosary, she was hooked.

"Shortly afterwards, I started making more. What came with me making rosaries was an increase in me praying the Rosary. And what came with an increase in me praying the Rosary came a greater understanding of the significance of the rosary."

The next school year, Postl helped organize and lead a rosary service-making project at school, which allowed her to include her classmates. The project was a success, and Postl and her classmates donated the rosaries they made to a local nursing home and to people encountering difficulties. The best, however, was yet to come.

"During my junior year, I embarked on my biggest project yet," Postl said. "I, along with a group of other students, gave rosaries to four 5th grade classes and two 2nd grade classes in the system. In two months, we made nearly 100 rosaries."








Postl says the students were excited to receive the rosaries, adding some even came up to hug her afterwards. The project continues to grow, and Postl and her classmates have plans to donate even more of them to our Regis Catholic Schools elementary students this spring. She also helped lead a rosary-making project for your younger sister's confirmation group.

"I've lost count of how many rosaries I've made," Postl said. "These rosaries are now in the hands of young and old both locally and globally. I might never know the full extent of the spiritual benefits for any of the people who have prayed a rosary I helped make. However, I do know the more people pray the Rosary, the bigger the impact on the world will be. I'm humbled to be a part of that." After graduation, Postl plans to attend the University of Mary in Bismarck, North Dakota to pursue a degree in biology education. She says her teachers at Regis helped her make this decision, especially Dr. Anne Geraghty, who taught her science for three years.

"Through her excellent teaching, I was able to discover my love for science, and biology in particular," Postl said.

Postl also recognizes and appreciates the impact her religion teachers have had during her high school career, especially Mrs. Ellen Killian and Mrs. Tracy Yengo. She says Mrs. Killian helped get her interested in making rosaries and has supported her through the life of the project.

While Postl is quick to highlight the tremendous impact all of the Regis teachers and staff have had in her life, those same people say she is the one who has made a big difference.

"Lorren's love and reverence for Jesus is genuine and shown to her classmates by word and action," said Regis Campus Minister Kristin Betlej. "I can always count on her to volunteer at Mass or help me with any ministry-related task. She has never been afraid to speak the Truth in the classroom."

"Lorren has the heart to help others in need and she has the graciousness to know when to help and when to let them struggle," added Laurie Zukaitis, one of Postl's teachers. "I have been enthralled with her ability to discuss with classmates so that they see other points of views in literature. She does not back down from her Catholic beliefs and it is not an easy thing to do to stand up to others who go with the flow instead of doing what is right."

With graduation just a few months away, Postl is looking to the future, while reflecting on the past.

"I'm grateful for the opportunity to interact with all the people I have in my time at Regis," Postl said. "God has worked through them in amazing ways, and I know that as I continue to look back on these experiences over my life, I will see how God works through them even more clearly." "Receiving this scholarship means the world to me," Cronk said. "It is an absolute honor for me to be selected and have the chance to represent Regis




