Report from the Dean



"I have met amazing people doing amazing things out of a deep love of God and neighbor."

The longer I have been a part of the Regis family, the more opportunities I have had to meet amazing people doing amazing things out of a deep love of God and neighbor. Most recently, several of our stakeholders gathered for strategic planning, giving up two of their Saturdays to do so. Thank you!

Our last Regis Catholic Schools Strategic Plan (forged in 2013) proved to be a great success. In a time of conflict and transition and challenge, it provided marching orders to our administrative team, several of whom were new additions. The plan included a humble acknowledgement of areas needing growth and improvement. As someone who joined the Regis family in 2012, I have been grateful to see all the areas that have improved over the last seven years. Our administrators and staff have done outstanding work in recruiting kindergartners and retaining families – especially during those "bridge" years (moving into grade 6 and into grade 9). Our middle school and high school, once reeling

from turnover and lack of stable leadership, have improved in multiple areas: campus ministry, student involvement in faith, stable leadership, building safety and security, ever improving performance in mathematics, and new opportunities for learning and for college credits (online courses, CVTC courses, shared courses with other Eau Claire schools, etc.). Our parish priests have a strong and well-appreciated presence in all our schools, both in the sacraments and in the classrooms. We paid off our longstanding debt. We provided additional opportunities to our staff to gain advanced degrees and ongoing professional development. Unlike the other six systems in the diocese, we have viable future leadership candidates within our own ranks. We have a much more consistent K-12 curriculum than we used to. I could go on and on. These things did not just happen by accident. Having a plan and updating the initiatives year by year helped us keep our focus.

However, with six years elapsed, we were definitely due to step back and look at everything once again. Much has changed since 2013. We now participate in the Wisconsin Parental Choice Program – which brings in more revenue but also new challenges and new opportunities. We are working seriously at recruiting Spanish-language families to our system. There are at least 40 kids regularly going to Mass whom we would love to persuade to join the Regis family. The language barrier is only one challenge. We need to connect with them culturally as well and train our own people to do so. Finally, we are all aware of other ever-increasing challenges that touch our whole society these days: mental and emotional health, school security, internet pornography, secularism, loss of faith, church scandals, political polarization, and so on.

Nevertheless, some things remain the same. Far and away our #1 item of discussion was improving teacher pay and teacher retention. Even though we gave a couple of much appreciated raises to our staff in recent years, they still are paid far less than their public school counterparts. We all acknowledged that there is no "silver bullet" solution – but we will be calling a task force to look relentlessly at all options to figure out a better future.

Our plan must now be reviewed, revised, and recommended for approval by our other bodies; Education Commission, Finance Council, Regis Catholic Schools Foundation. Then it can be approved by the six parishes that govern us: St. James, Newman, St. Olaf, Sacred Heart-St. Patrick, Immaculate Conception, and St. Mary Altoona. Then comes the real work of implementing it. I hope that it will be as successful as the previous plan. Please pray for us!

Every year, hundreds of thousands of high school students across the country take the ACT. The highest possible composite score is a 36 and those with composite scores of 34 or higher are among the top 1% of test takers.

Adam Pernsteiner scored a 35.

he Regis High School senior took the ACT three times, with the most recent being in June of 2018. He says he used his experience during his first two attempts to hone his skills and prepare for his third attempt.

"Several teachers handed out information to help with taking the test," he said. "Mrs. Killian, for example, gave out a packet of common words used on the ACT and their definitions."

Pernsteiner says it was this help, plus his work ethic and drive to succeed, that enabled him achieve this accomplishment.

"I feel overjoyed," he said. "The driving factor is my desire to be successful in my career later in life. I want to have as many opportunities as possible."

Pernsteiner says earning a high ACT composite score means he will not have to worry about that number holding him back in any way.

"I want to do well now so that I can attend a university that will allow me to have those opportunities."

It is also a testament to the academic rigor offered within the Regis system.

Pernsteiner has been a student at Regis Catholic Schools since kindergarten, attending St. Mary's Elementary. His sister, Alyson, graduated from Regis High School in 2016. She is currently attending the University of St. Thomas and majoring in Biology.

Mr. Mike Nerbovig, a math teacher at Regis High School, taught Adam Trigonometry and Calculus. He says Adam always worked hard in his drive for academic success. "Adam is an ideal student whose intellectual curiosity and persistence enable him to succeed at the highest academic level," Mr. Nerbovig said. "Besides being an outstanding academician, Adam accepts personal responsibility for his own learning. His effort may entail additional reading, seeking out guidance from teachers, or discussing ideas with other students in class."

Mr. Nerbovig says he and his teaching colleagues work hard to help our students achieve at the highest level possible.

"I am thankful every day for the opportunity to provide our students with a challenging and rewarding mathematical experience," he said. "I believe that the caring environment at Regis and the willingness of teachers to spend time outside of the classroom to help individual students enables them to reach their highest potential."

During his time at Regis, Pernsteiner has also played tennis and participated in National Honor Society, Mock Trial, Math Team, Academic Challenge, and peer mentoring. He is currently making his decision as to where he will pursue a college degree, but says he would like to study engineering. He adds he feels well prepared for the future thanks to his Regis education.

"I had the opportunity to take several college level classes, such as Mr. Nelson's History 202 class and Honors Calculus. These classes have given me the ability to experience what college classes are like and earn college credit."

Experiences that will help Pernsteiner find success well into the future.

LEGO Robotics Competition

Regis students participated in the 13th Annual LEGO Robotics Competition on December 12 in Rochester, Minnesota. This year there were 480 students from 163 teams competing across three divisions.

Students spend several months building and programming their LEGO robots to solve weekly problems. Their work is capped off each year by the competition where students demonstrate the program they wrote to solve a long-term problem. Students also work on a short-term project, which requires teams to solve a problem from start to finish during a set amount of time.

Math Competition
