Report From the Dean

Do Catholic Schools Matter in Matters Of Faith?



My seventeen years of priesthood have been blessed with Catholic schools. Whether it be the grade school programs at Durand, Lima, and Menomonie or our own Regis Catholic Schools, I have seen, first hand, the difference Catholic schools make in the lives of our youth.

Some, however, will question the importance of Catholic schools citing decreasing pew numbers and the perception of faithlessness by the time young people attend college. I often get frustrated when people make these presumptions about Catholic schools and the decline of pew counts in Churches. Some of that frustration stems from the faith I saw on our college campuses, ministering to the students of UW-La Crosse and UW-Stout. The other source of that frustration is from seeing how Catholic schools have helped build up faith in many young people both as a former Regis chaplain and now as Dean. In light of this, I felt a need to offer a sober, yet hopeful reflection on the faith of our youth and the role Catholic schools play in that faith.

The research group called CARA did a study on what age Millennials and Generation Z are deciding whether or not they will continue the practice of their faith. When I started my priesthood in 2003, the study identified that youth by their sophomore year of high school made that decision. In 2016, the study was done again and it found that this age had dropped to as young as 10 to 13 years of age.

What does this mean? It means that in late grade school to early middle school, youth are making life decisions about their faith. If ever there was a statistic that emphasized the importance of strong Catholic grade schools and middle schools, this would be the statistic. This is why I am so thankful for the work our staffs do at our Regis campuses of St. Mary's Elementary School, Immaculate Conception Elementary School, St. James Elementary School, and Regis Middle School. Their influence not only advances our student's reading, writing, and arithmetic, but also sets foundations of helping our young people make these life decisions.

Unfortunately, these numbers can also be used to question the value of Catholic high schools and universities. The argument goes, "If faith is determined in grade school, why have high school?" I would strongly argue against this mentality. To justify a "primary school only" Catholic school model reduces faith formation to a type of Swiss watch that you just wind up and let it go, presuming that once they make their faith decision that there is no more formation needed. People do not operate that way and neither should Churches and schools. Faith is ongoing and formation in needed at every stage of life.

At the same time, I do think we should reflect on the question, "Do we treat faith formation as a type of Swiss watch that once we wind it in our youth there is no need of a 'rewind?'" To state this differently; How much of Catholic education (both in schools and parishes) has become overly "informative" and not "formative"?

Given the blessing of my years of college ministry at UW-La Crosse and UW-Stout, I sometimes get asked, "Father, do you see a difference between Catholic school kids and public school kids at the college level?" The answer I can easily give is yes, but not the yes that many people would presume. What I saw at UW-La Crosse and Stout were two, clear realities.

Many Catholic school students came to state colleges with a very good grounding in their Catholic faith, but the integration of what they knew about faith and how they lived faith was, at times, not quite there yet. This often led to an initial "freshman drift" where Catholic youth would let go of their faith at first, but then start to realize, from their Catholic school foundation, that something was missing and returned with a heart ready for spiritual integration.

On the other side of the spectrum, public school students would come to Newman

Centers with deep zeal and passion for many things, including their faith, but it was often a "ready, shoot, aim" approach to their passions. What I mean is that Catholic youth from public schools would be willing to lay in front of a bus for a cause and their faith, but they didn't always understand why they were doing so. They wanted to be integrated in word and action, but the "word" piece was sometimes a little behind the "action" piece.

The commonality I would see in college youth regardless of school background was a longing for authenticity. Whether it be the Church they attend, the field of study they pursued, or the life they lived, they didn't want something that was fake or superficial. They wanted something that was real and lived. And if they experienced Church as fake or superficial, then they leave in droves. If they find a Church that lives the Gospel, faith became like water to a dry sponge -They soaked it up immediately.

So, what does this mean for Regis Catholic Schools? As your Dean, I would like to ask all of us a simple question of discernment: Do we approach Regis as informative, formative, or both? No Catholic school is perfect and a school that proclaims to be such is buying into the fake and superficial aspects of society our youth detest. We are a good school with moments that are both spectacular and trying. Are we an authentic school? That is the question that is at the heart of helping our youth both grow in knowledge and faith. And how does your Dean answer this question? I think we are an authentic school, but, as with all things in faith, we also have a lot areas of growth to embrace. Welcome to the process of growing in holiness. Welcome to the process of becoming the Catholic School Christ desires us to become.

All teenagers have something they are passionate about; be it athletics, music, or art. For Regis High School senior Anna Allen, helping others is at the heart of who she is.



nna has been a student within the Regis Catholic Schools system since her early years at St. Mary's Elementary School in Altoona. When she was in 6th grade at Regis Middle School, Anna began organizing and hosting thrift sales in support of St. Jude Children's Research Hospital in Memphis, Tennessee.

"I chose St. Jude Children's Research Hospital because of its mission statement, which says no child should be denied treatment based on race, religion, or a family's ability to pay," Anna said. "Families should not have to worry about financial burdens when they are going through the stress of possibly losing a child."

Anna says she started small, using only a portion of her family's garage for her first few thrift sales. Year after year, her efforts grew, thanks in part to generous donations of items from members of the Regis Catholic Schools community and beyond.

"Without the support and donations from members of our Regis family, I would not have been able to raise the amount of money that I have," Anna said. "Those donations have made a huge difference and I would like to thank every single person and family who donated, shared Facebook posts about my events, or even just supported me throughout my journey."

In fact, Anna eventually received so many donations she started using the whole garage for her thrift sales, with her father adding special storage and shelving to help expand her efforts.

"I am beyond proud of Anna," said her mother, Julia Allen. "I know she will continue to help raise money in support of St. Jude Children's Research Hospital as long as the donations come in, even after she leaves for college in the fall."

Just how much has Anna raised in support of St. Jude Children's Research Hospital so far? \$28,115 and counting!

IMPACT OF COVID-19

As the COVID-19 pandemic began, Anna quickly realized she would not be able to continue to host her fundraiser thrift sales in the same way. Rather than slowing down, she worked even harder, moving things online. "Because hosting thrift sales in-person was not a safe option, I utilized things like Facebook Marketplace, Craigslist, and Sold 4 U Auctions," Anna said. "My sales have continued to be successful!"

"Anna has gone the extra mile so many times," added Julia. "She continues to go strong with selling, even during the pandemic. We have both been witness to so much need in our community over the past year, and Anna continues to work hard to do what she can to show her support."

VOLUNTEER WORK

Anna's impact doesn't stop at St. Jude Children's Research Hospital. Throughout her time as a student at Regis Catholic Schools, she has volunteered countless hours to help others right here in the Chippewa Valley.

"I enjoy doing volunteer work at both Mayo Clinic Health System, HSHS Sacred Heart Hospital, Feed My People Food Bank, Beacon House, Can Do Canines, and more," she said. "Can Do Canines has been one of my favorite opportunities, as I've had a chance to help foster dogs that are being trained as autism assist dogs, mobility dogs, hearing assist dogs, seizure assist dogs, and diabetes assist dogs."

"Anna is very modest and somewhat private in her giving and volunteering," her mother said. "She has many young girls and boys who look up to her as she continues to make a difference."

Those in the community have also taken note of the difference Anna is making through her service work. In 2015, she was selected as a local winner in the Kohl's Cares® Scholarship Program. Then, in 2018, she was recognized as the American Red Cross - Northwest Wisconsin Chapter Youth Good Samaritan.

In addition to her volunteer work, Anna has also been a very involved member of the student body during her time at Regis Catholic Schools.

"I have participated in various clubs, student council, and choir," she said. "I also played soccer all four years of high school and basketball during my freshman and sophomore years. I will always fondly remember our trip to the WIAA State Girls Soccer Tournament during my freshman year!"

Anna also says she has great respect for all of the teachers she has had over the years, highlighting former Regis Middle School teacher Jill Klotz's help in getting her thrift sales started.

"Every single teacher from elementary school all through high school deserves a thank you for not only their hard work and dedication, but also the role they played in helping me become a better person in and outside of the classroom," she said. "Even though Mrs. Klotz is no longer at Regis Catholic Schools, she is the one who helped me get my St. Jude Children's Research Hospital fundraisers started, and I could not have done it without her."

"Mrs. Klotz was such an inspiration for Anna," her mother added. "Her support went above and beyond just teaching in the classroom. She was very handson when it came to volunteering and service hours for her students. Mrs. Klotz ignited Anna's passion for helping others, allowing her to see how small actions can make a big difference."

"Being a student at Regis has meant more to me than just education," Anna added. "It has meant friendships, learning experiences, lifelong lessons, and growth in my faith. Without Regis and its community, I would not be where I am at today."

FUTURE PLANS

Following graduation from Regis High School in May, Anna will attend the University of Minnesota Rochester to pursue a career in the medical field. It is a decision she says she made soon after she began her thrift sales.

"As I learned more about St. Jude Children's Research Hospital and the impact it has in the lives of patients and families, I realized I wanted to be a doctor myself," Anna said. "I have a drive and a passion to help others and this feels like the perfect path for me."

"Anna truly is a wonderful young lady, daughter, sister, student, neighbor, and friend," her mother

St. Jude Children's Research Hospital treats children from all 50 states and from around the world. One of those children is also a student here at Regis Catholic Schools.

In October of 2017, just one day after her 9th birthday, current 6th grade student

Sascha Stephens was diagnosed with medulloblastoma.

"The oncologists who originally

diagnosed Sascha were not giving us a lot of hope for her survival in the days immediately following her emergency surgery," said Sascha's mom, Deborah Becker. "They pegged her chances of living 5 years at 30 percent."

After also hearing about the possible side effects of the treatment suggested and knowing about experimental treatments being run all over the globe, Deborah says her husband, Casey, reached out to St. Jude Children's Hospital.

"Within hours, we received word that, pending verification of Sascha's diagnosis, St. Jude would accept her into their cutting-edge SJMB12 medulloblastoma trial," Deborah said.

added. "She has made my blessing as a parent truly a gift from God and I know she will succeed in whatever path she chooses."

As she prepares for what's next, Anna says she will continue to focus on hope, which is at the core of what inspires her to give back to others.

"Hope that someday I will make a difference in someone's life, hope that others will want to give back in little or big ways, and hope that this world isn't always as bad as it seems. My hope is that we all support ourselves and each other so we can get to a place where politics, race, and religion will help build us up and not break us down." Deborah Becker



Deborah said the family's prayers were answered as Sascha began receiving world-class treatment. Thanks to the generosity of those who support St. Jude Children's Hospital, families never receive a bill for treatment, travel, housing, or food. Sascha's family received an apartment in Memphis to live in during her outpatient treatment, a grocery stipend, and child-first care.

"In fact, with the help of growth hormone, Sascha herself is once again back in the normal range on the growth chart," Deborah said. "We are buried in normalcy and couldn't be happier!"

> The decision to tear down the building came following increased maintenance and utility costs at the closed school and parish center. The razing of the building began in November of 2020, with plans to use the empty lot for a larger parking area. When finished, this new parking lot will have 260 parking stalls. The parish rents parking spaces to the neighboring Mayo Clinic Health System Luther campus and expects an additional revenue of approximately \$93,000 per year thanks to the expanded lot.

In 1906, the first Catholic grade school in Eau Claire, St. Patrick's School, was built as part of St. Patrick's Parish. The building soon housed even more students, when Father A.B.C. Dunne added a two-year high school to St. Patrick's grade school. A third high school year was added to the building in 1919.

Casper Dowd, Father Dunne's successor, began the construction of St. Patrick's High School and gymnasium in 1927, which housed a four-year high school program. The first class to graduate at St. Patrick's High School was in 1932.

As the demand for Catholic education grew by the early 1950s, the four-year school was not large enough to serve the number of prospective students in the four relatively new Eau Claire-area Catholic parishes. (St. Patrick's Parish, St. James the Greater Parish, Immaculate Conception Parish, and St. Olaf Parish) On September 24, 1951, Principal Father John Paul (Bishop John Paul) made the commitment to begin a fundraising drive for a new central Catholic high school, which would meet the needs of all the parishes in the area.

At the same time, St. Patrick's High School was made a central location and the name was changed to Regis, which is Latin for "Christ the King". Principal Father John Paul was instrumental in the construction of the present Regis High School and Regis Middle School. Building began on September 24, 1952 and the new school was in use by the 1953-54 school year.

Prior to the razing, St. Patrick's School opened its doors for the public to get a final look of the building and to take home some mementos. People claimed things like furniture and books, and even doors, tiles, and pieces from the gym floor!

We know this building held special memories for many of our alumni and it will be missed. Thank you, St. Patrick's School, for the role you played in the history of Catholic education in Eau Claire.





Sports Report

Girls Basketball

The Regis Girls Basketball team battled to a final record of 12-9, including a tie for 3rd place in the Cloverbelt-West with a 6-5 conference record. This was a major improvement from the previous season's 3-21 record. The team played best when it mattered most, including a single game, school record of 40 points by Makenna Rohrscheib against the conference champions Osseo-Fairchild. The team also welcomed new Head Coach Teddy Joas to the Regis Girls Basketball program.

The team had a four game winning streak in the middle of the season and won its final 3 games (all conference games) to end the regular season. The playoff opener was at Colfax, and thanks to a game winner by Rohrscheib at the buzzer, the Ramblers propelled their way into the regional semifinal game at Fall Creek. The Ramblers would lose a very close, physical game by the score 36-30.

The team had contributions from two freshmen, Ashley Chilson and Ava Highman, but were ultimately led by the five seniors. Caitlin Klink, Katie Andrews, Adrienne Morning, Ally Leis, and Jessica Sabbagh provided great leadership throughout the season and undoubtedly have left their legacy while laying a great foundation for future Ramblers in the program. Special congratulations to our players named to the 2020-21 Cloverbelt Conference Girls All-Conference Team! Makenna Rohrscheib was named to the First Team and was also recognized as Player of the Year. Katie Andrews was named as an Honorable Mention.

Boys Basketball

The Regis Boys Basketball team was able to play 20 games this past season, compiling a record of 12-8. The season started off slow, as the team played some very good competition early on and took some time to find its stride. After starting the season 2-7 and having to take a mid-season quarantine break, the team finished with a 10 game winning streak before losing to Spring Valley in the 2nd round of the playoffs. During that 10 game winning streak, the team was able to have two great road wins vs. Fall Creek and Altoona, being the only conference team that beat Fall Creek this season.

The team is extremely thankful for the contributions of its five seniors. (JP Wolterstorff, Aaron Haselwander, David Haselwander, Devin Dykes, and Aiden Ritger) JP had an outstanding senior campaign, leading the state in Division 4 in 3-point percentage at 49.5%. He led the team in scoring with 20 points per game. He was also named 1st Team All-Conference and was selected as Conference Co-Player of the Year. Other All-Conference selections were Kendon Krogman (2nd Team) and Jeffrey Ritger (Honorable Mention).

Wrestling

This year's Regis-Altoona Wrestling season brought many challenges that were different from any other year. As a team, its participants rose to the occasion, adapted, and conquered for the love of the sport.

This year's team was the biggest yet, with 19 wrestlers. They gave their all during practice and especially at meets. RAW ended the season 7-3, turning many heads, and giving our wrestlers the recognition they deserve. The team excelled individually at regionals with four champions (Payton Kostka, Chase Kostka, Brayden Albee, and Caden Weber), as well placing 2nd as a team. In addition, Deaglan O'Connell and Noah Knowblock were also sectional qualifiers. At sectionals, Payton Kostka took 1st place, with the team taking 5th place.

At the state tournament in Adams-Friendship, Payton Kostka took 3rd place, wrestling tough to close out his high school career. Years ago when the program restarted, Payton was its only wrestler and this year, he was the leader of the team of 19. We congratulate him on an amazing career!

Hockey

The RAM Hockey team started the season with a win against Wisconsin Rapids. After being down 5-0 in the second period, the team came from behind to win 7-6 and went on to win the next game by a score of 8-2 to start the season with a 2-0-0 record.

RAM Hockey had its ups-and-downs over the next few games, but was able to end the first half of the season with a 5-4-0 record. The team had an extremely tough schedule the second half of its season, including six conference games, ending the season with a record of 8-11-0 and seeded 5th heading into the playoffs. The team started the playoffs with a 5-4 win against the 4th seed, West Salem. The next game was against the 1st seed, Baldwin-Woodville. After being down by two goals late in the second period, RAM Hockey was able to come from behind and win 7-6 in overtime. After upsetting the top seeded team in the section, the team went on to play the 2nd seed, Somerset, in the sectional final game for a chance to go to the state tournament.
