Report From the Dean

“By Whose Authority? Exploring the Relationship Between Family Life and Schools”

One of the most important relationships to properly understand is the relationship between family life and school life. On the surface, it may seem pretty basic – family life has to do with what happens under your roof and school life has to do with what happens under the school's roof. At the same time, we know that those roofs often overlap.

From the perspective of faith, this messy comingling of family and community makes sense. When you look through the Bible for passages about marriage, the vast majority of them speak of the relationship between Christ and the Church. Therefore, Scripture itself presents family life as more than just a couple and their children, but implies a broader vision of the family of faith.

For example, parents are to be the primary educators of their children. On the surface, that may be misinterpreted as “Great, now I can tell all the teachers of my children what I do and don't want them to learn.” Don't get me wrong, healthy communication between parents and teachers is essential, but when looking at the Catechism of the Catholic Church, we gain insight into what the core lessons of “family education” should be.

Parents have the first responsibility for the education of their children. They bear witness to this responsibility first by creating a home where tenderness, forgiveness, respect, fidelity, and disinterested service are the rule. The home is well suited for education in the virtues. This requires an apprenticeship in self-denial, sound judgment, and self-mastery – the preconditions of all true freedom. Parents should teach their children to subordinate the “material and instinctual dimensions to interior and spiritual ones.” Parents have a grave responsibility to give good example to their children. By knowing how to acknowledge their own failings to their children, parents will be better able to guide and correct them. (CCC 2223)

Tenderness, respect, fidelity, service, virtue, self-denial, sound judgment, an openness to the spiritual life, providing good examples, and not fearing to teach their children through life experience – even in the face of failure. This is to be, from the eyes of faith, the first

“homeschool curricula” that families are to embrace. From my time as Chaplain at Regis, it always broke my heart when students would come to me because they lacked tenderness in their home. I recall eye watering conversations in which respect, forgiveness, and humility were far from the family dynamic. It was devastating when kids would enter my office looking for a “homeschool” lesson, when what I was assigned to do was accompany their presumed faith education at home

with a more detailed exploration of the Church's intellectual tradition. Put another way, I would often find myself stuck under “two-roof” education in the challenging sense, needing to encourage families to embrace the lessons of the Domestic Church of the family and not seek that education to come primarily from Catholic schools.

We are living in a time where not only families look for schools to teach the lessons that are reserved for families, but some schools are relishing the opportunity to step under the “home roof” and form youth in ways that are contrary to home life. This is a dangerous cultural trend that needs to be avoided. A school should never

replace the lessons of the home and the home needs to support the education of the school that assists the formation of their children. And we need to walk together and trust one another to realize that education and family life are similar to Scripture passages about marriage: An odd comingling of the language that is specific to a household, but also points us to a broader sense of community.

Here's a question I ask all Regis families to reflect on: How can Regis Catholic Schools better support our families and how can our families better support Regis Catholic Schools?

There's nothing quite like good 'ol messy fun! Children at our Genesis Child Development Center celebrated with a special morning full of sensory play.

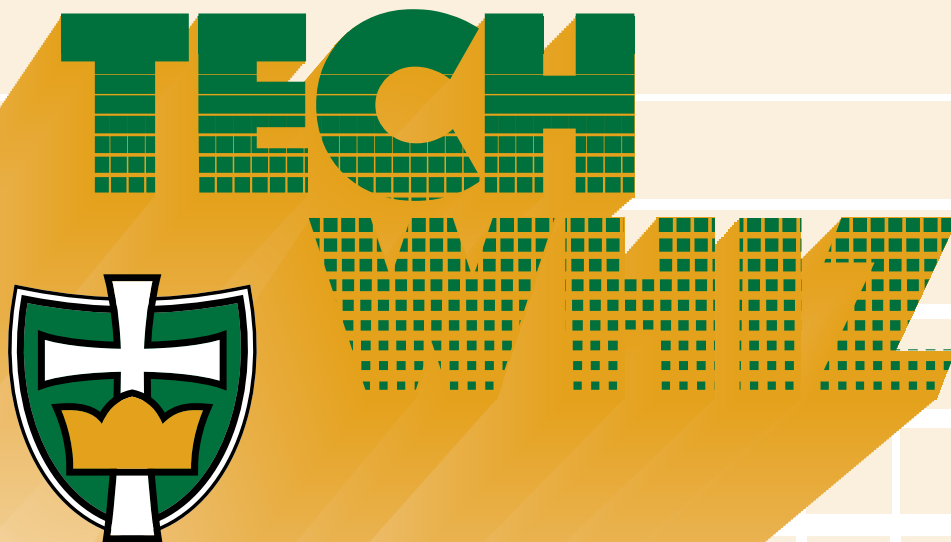

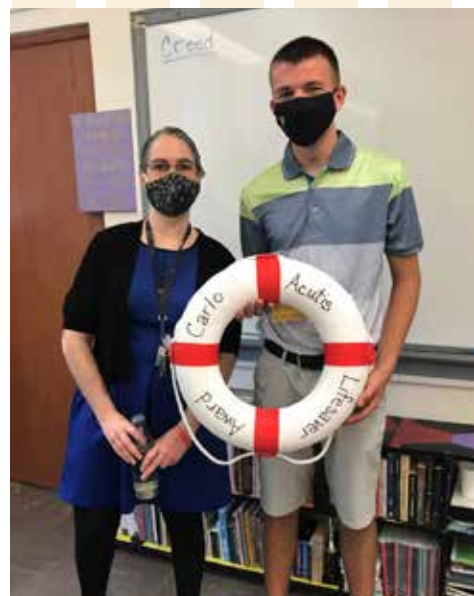
At the beginning of his senior year at Regis High School, Zane Cullinan received a “Lifesaver Award”. And while it was a fun way to recognize him, the amount of time and energy Zane has put into making a difference at Regis Catholic Schools is nothing to laugh at.

Zane has been part of the system since his days in kindergarten at St. Mary’s Elementary School and he has always been drawn to the world of technology. We aren’t exaggerating when we say he has been helping our system since elementary school. Just ask longtime Regis Catholic Schools teacher and administrator Suzy Sturz!

“Zane was born with the desire to help others at all times,” Sturz said. “His ability and knowledge of technology was very apparent to me when he was my 4th grade student

at St. Mary’s Elementary School. I was given a projector to use as a teaching tool and fumbled around with it for weeks. One day during a milk break, Zane explained the ins and outs of this new piece of technology to me and from that day on, I was able to use my new smart board!”

Since those early years helping our teachers understand technology, Zane has put in countless hours helping staff, setting up and running live streams of athletic and special events, and fixing what’s been



broken. He says this all comes from a curiosity of the unknown and a desire to make a difference.

“Technology is so new that I don’t know what’s next,” Zane said. “It also seems to confuse a lot of people and I like helping people. If I can find a way to help more people, I’m willing to learn.”

Zane has taken on even more responsibility over the last several months following the hiring of Eric Gwiazda, our new Regis Catholic Schools Director of Technology. Zane has been instrumental in helping Mr. Gwiazda become familiar with our system and continues to assist with many important technology tasks.

“Zane’s willingness to help out and take on large projects with little to no experience puts him ahead of many of his peers,” said Gwiazda. “Zane’s ability to ask questions and problem solve will help him go far in developing his current career path, which will eventually lead to running his own department one day.”

“Zane is that kid,” added Regis Middle & High School Principal Paul Pedersen. “The

"Plan A is UW-Stout for a B.S. in Computer Networking and Information Technology and Plan B is Chippewa Valley Technical College in the IT Network Specialist program. I'm just waiting for the final confirmation," he said.



In true Zane fashion, he plans to stay connected with this alma mater and continue to assist where he can. However, he encourages his fellow students to get involved in the years ahead.

"There are a few things I still plan to be involved in, but I also want to let a lot go so others are required to fill in the gap," Zane said. "That will ultimately help encourage others to step up and get started in different positions."

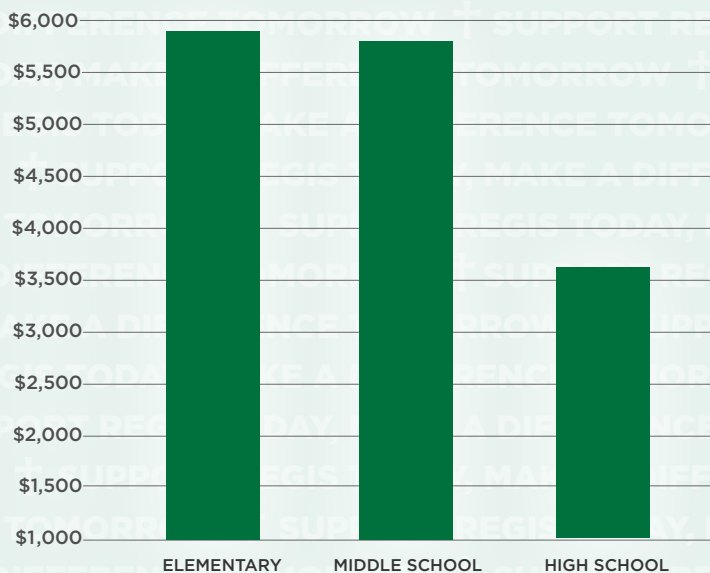

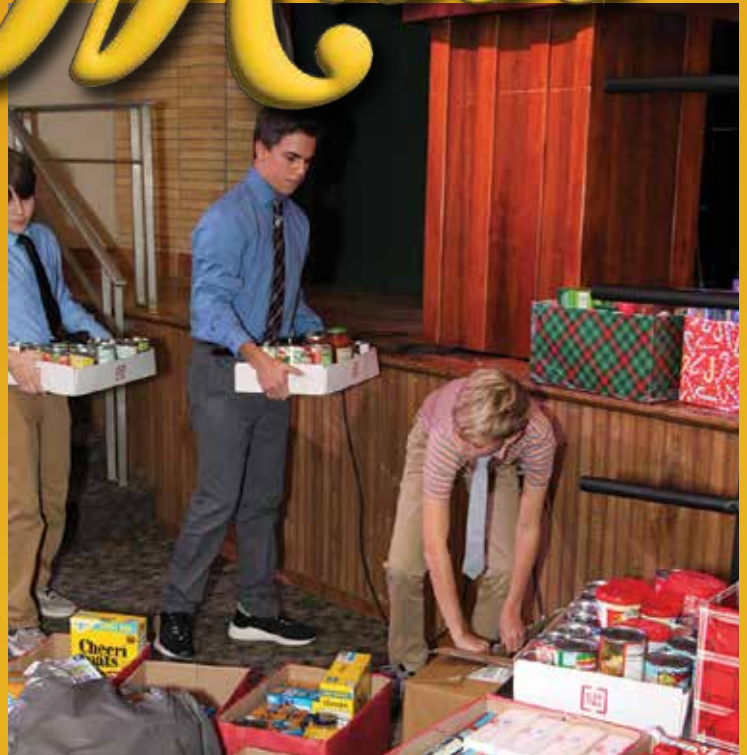
I have been at Regis for many years, and God willing, I hope to be able to retire from here someday.

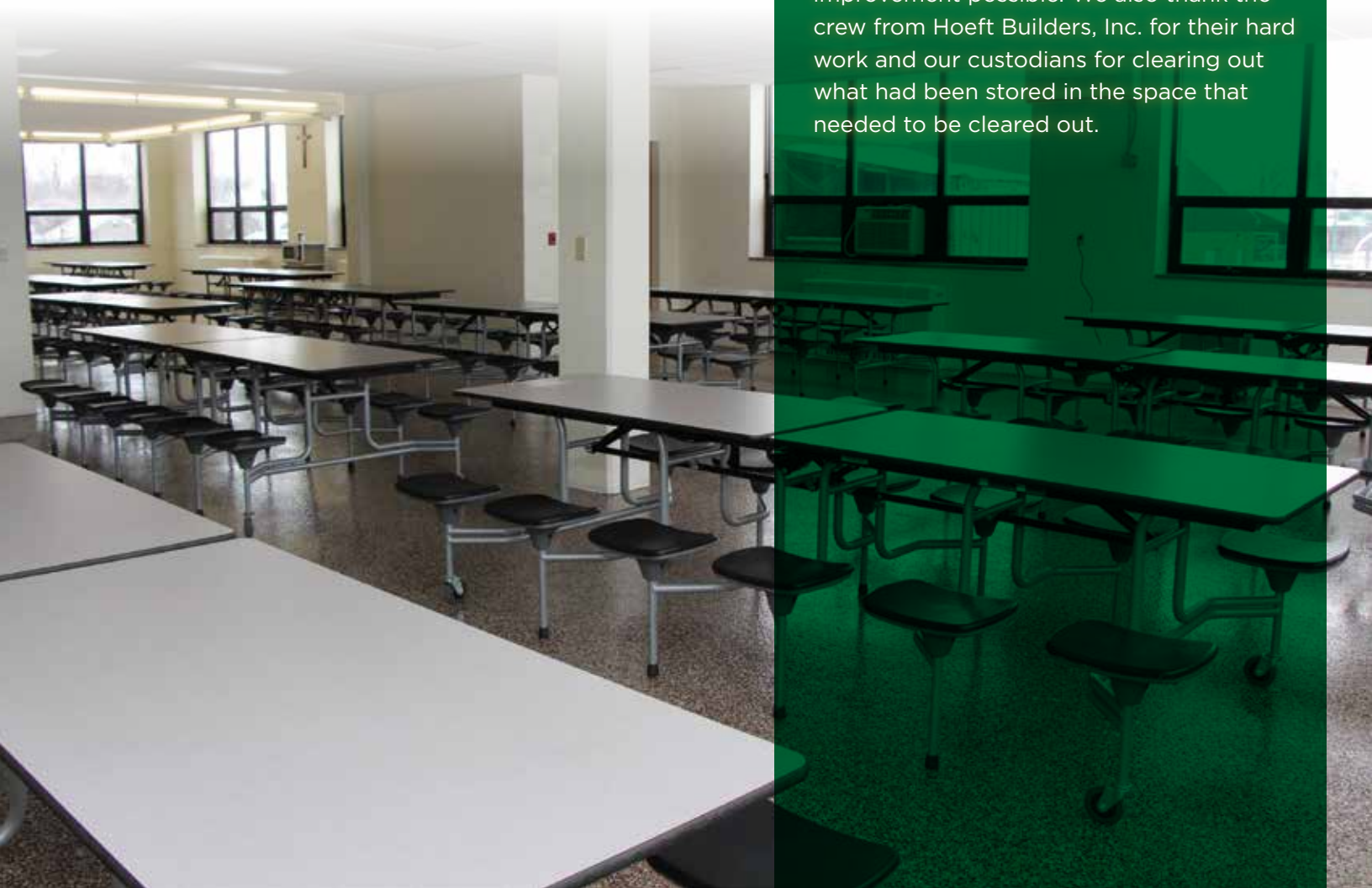


Regis Campus Cafeteria Project

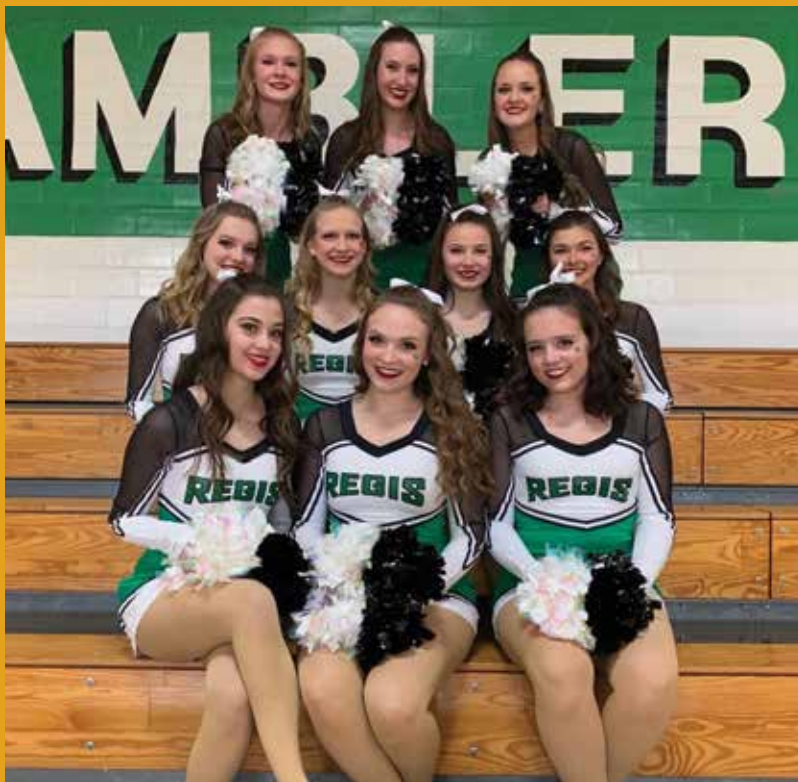
Hockey

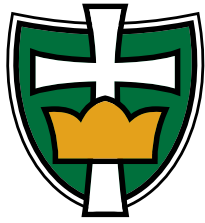

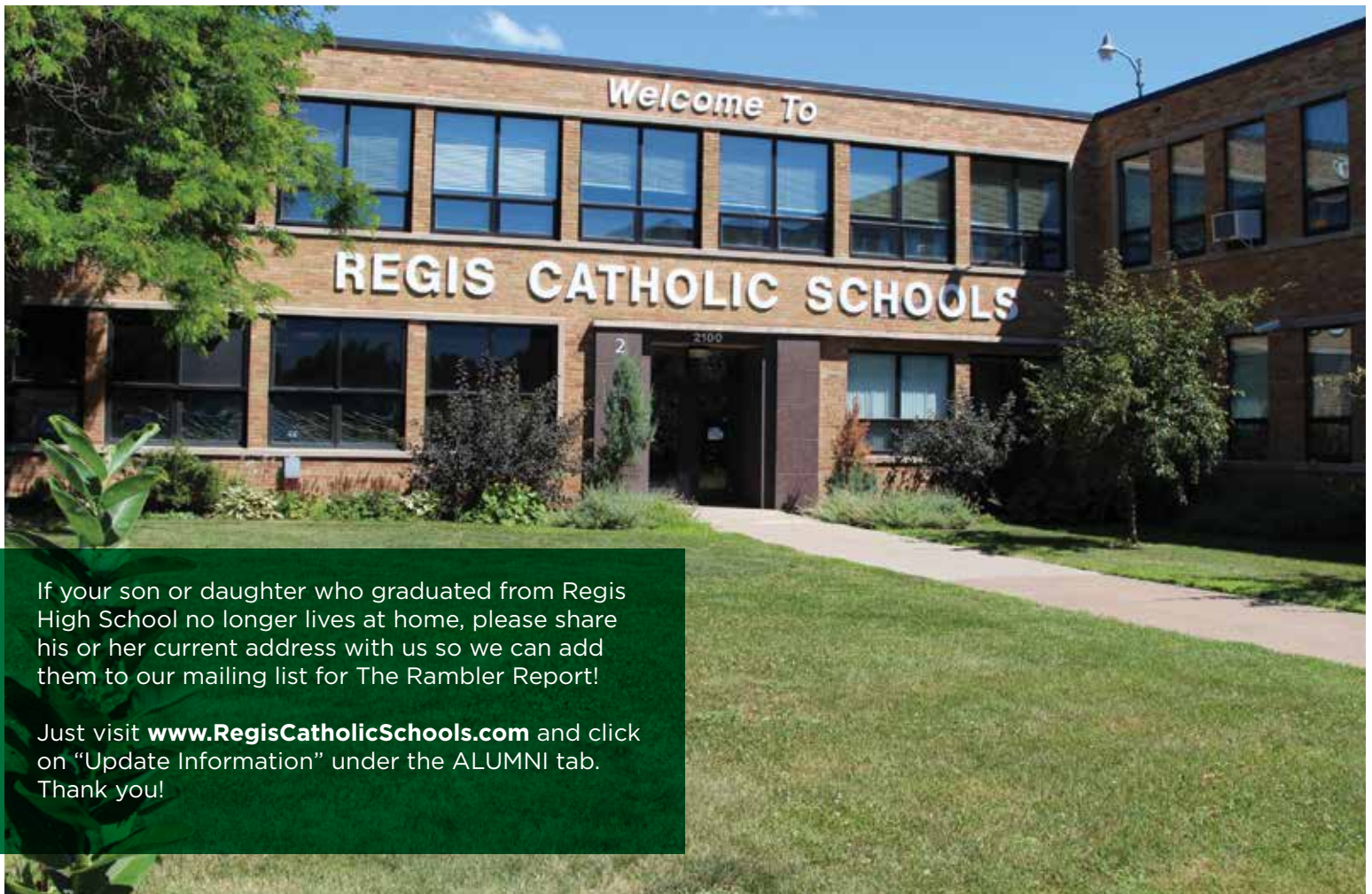
