It is with great excitement that we announce the adoption of new math resources for our elementary classrooms!

During this past school year, Emily Brissette (5th Grade Teacher at St. Mary's Elementary School) and Carisa Smiskey (Principal at St. Mary's Elementary School and Curriculum Coordinator) co-chaired a Math Resource Team to research and select textbook series that best meet the needs of Regis Catholic Schools. Every core teacher was able to review and provide feedback on the resources available within four different textbook series.





Overwhelmingly, the teachers found enVision Mathematics to be the most closely aligned with our Diocesan math curriculum and best suited to meet the needs of all students with differentiated online and physical materials. We are excited for these new resources to be delivered later this summer and receive training on implementing enVision Mathematics during our professional development days in August.

Beginning with a fast 7 and 1 start to their 2021 baseball campaign, the Ramblers then hit a bumpy rut, going 3 and 5 over their next eight games before ending the regular season with a well-played 6 to 4 win over Western Cloverbelt champion Altoona.

Heading in the WIAA playoffs with an 11 and 6 record, Regis proceeded to go on a remarkable run, winning five playoff games in a row and upsetting four higher seeded teams in the process, as the opponents became progressively more difficult with each matchup:

In the sectional final, Regis upended a powerful St. Croix Falls squad that came into the game with a 25 and 1 record, a #2 ranking in division 3, and a #15 ranking across Wisconsin regardless of division. Considering the strong opponent and underdog circumstances, it would not be an overstatement to say it was one of the more noteworthy -- if not greatest -- victories in the 66-year history of the Regis baseball program.

Alas, after peeling off four consecutive upset victories, the Green and White's magic faded at Fox Cities stadium in Appleton. Facing off against a 24 and 2 Coleman Cougars team ranked #1 in division 3, the Ramblers jumped out to a 3-0 lead in the first inning before Coleman responded with two runs in the bottom of the first. Regis tacked on a run in the top of the fourth to hold a 4-2 lead, only to see Coleman plate four runs in the bottom of the fourth to take a 6-4 lead they would never relinquish. Final score: Coleman 6, Regis 4.

In completing the season with an overall mark of 16 and 7, the Ramblers also finished fourth in the competitive Western Cloverbelt Conference with 9 and 5 record.

Eau Claire tiny home maker uses reclaimed materials

St. Patrick's School may have been razed last year, but that doesn't mean someone couldn't take a walk down memory lane by strolling across the old gym floor.

Planks from the former gym — the site of thousands of physical education classes and basketball games for nearly a century — now form the hardwood floor of a custom tiny home crafted by No Boundaries Tiny Homes, an Eau Claire-based salvage and construction company with a penchant for repurposing building materials.



The company's first house is dubbed the St. Patrick's Tiny Home because it is filled with materials salvaged from the former Catholic school in downtown Eau Claire.

The house, destined to become an Airbnb rental on Long Lake in Chippewa County, will be the first of many such projects that reuse materials otherwise headed for the landfill if No Boundaries owners Chad Dalhoe and Graham Barnes realize their vision.

"Everything you see in this tiny home, other than the cabinets and windows, would be in a landfill," Dalhoe said, gesturing to the nearly finished project in the company's shop, also made from 95% reused materials, just south of Eau Claire. "It breaks your heart."

A tour of the 325-square-foot home, which includes two lofts for sleeping, a separate bathroom and a combination kitchen, dining and living room, revealed several examples of creative repurposing.

A slate chalkboard from the school is mounted on the wall near the door, the walls are made of boards culled from a local lumberyard's scrap bin, the built-in dining table is crafted from a former school science table using legs from salvaged church pews. Plans call for using metal decorations from a 3rd Ward house as safety railings at the edge of the lofts, science table legs and a church pew back for a headboard and former St. Pat's intercom speakers as the vintage housing for contemporary Bluetooth speakers.

We'll use anything with a story that would be interesting from a design standpoint," Barnes said. "It's literally like a living work of art when you're in it.

The custom nature of the work takes time, Barnes said, "but the results are pretty cool."

The company's two-pronged business model – building new products and using reclaimed materials – ensures no two tiny homes will be exactly the same.

That creative side is one of the things that attracted Eau Claire real estate agent Knelly

Dettinger to collaborating with No Boundaries.

She is buying the St. Patrick's Tiny Home and hopes to buy several more of the tiny homes that could be used as rentals or second homes on recreational properties or even as movable homes for what she calls "nontraditional snow birds" — younger people who can work remotely and would rather be based in a warmer climate during winter.

"Tiny homes are already super popular on the coasts," said Dettinger, of TruLiving Real Estate.

She is excited about the ability of No Boundaries to build custom tiny homes that are designed to fit specific lots and terrain.

"Chad is an expert-level craftsman builder and he has one of the most creative minds in construction you'll ever run across, and Graham is the perfect partner because he believes in the vision and can communicate it very well," Dettinger said. "If you want someone who will truly listen and make what's in your head come alive, No Boundaries is your place." The partners insist they have modest ambitions for earning income from their business but big dreams about making a difference in the world.

Not only are they focused on sustainability by reusing materials, but they also have their sights set on the affordable housing shortage.

Dalhoe and Barnes believe they could help address the lack of affordable housing by building custom tiny homes, starting at about \$80,000, for folks ready to do some serious downsizing or for starter homes for people looking to build some equity.

Instead of addressing the issue strictly through affordable housing developments, the city could promote building two tiny houses on some lots, possibly using salvaged materials from houses being razed to build a new garage on the sites, Dalhoe said.

"This can work, and I think Eau Claire would be a great place to do it," he said.

The two old friends reconnected this past winter when Dalhoe contacted Barnes for help creating a

website. They got to talking and ended up agreeing to be business partners. Dalhoe brings decades of experience in construction, and Barnes brings a background in business, marketing and graphic design.

In Dalhoe, Barnes also found a receptive ear for his ideas about green initiatives.

To take the company's commitment to sustainability to the next level, No Boundaries recently created an "Ambassador" program to seek people who "want to get some good feels by helping Mother Earth and earn a chance to snag some swag" at the same time," according to its website (noboundariestinyhomes.com).

The idea is that the company is hoping the public will serve as its eyes and ears in informing No Boundaries about structures that are going to be taken down. Referrals then lead to discounts and freebies from local businesses.

The goal is simple: "The more salvageable materials our company is able to cull from these projects, the more board feet of lumber saved in standing trees and less waste impacts the landfill," the website states.

The passion is apparent, as Dalhoe's eyes light up at the prospect of getting into more old buildings ahead of the wrecking ball.

Standing in a barn filled with church pews, benches, cabinets, lumber and doors from St. Pat's, Dalhoe proclaimed, "If we have our own wrecking company, we can get everything."

Regis High School Alumnus Recognized for Catholic-Based Leadership

Confidentiality, ethical practices, and morality. These are the three things Dan Pichler '79 has kept at the forefront during his career in accounting.

The Regis grad retired at the end of May after spending 38 years at Wipfli, a full-service accounting and consulting firm in Green Bay. Prior to his retirement, Pichler was one of five recipients of the 2021 "Faith That Works" Award given out by The Compass, the official newspaper of the Catholic Diocese of Green Bay.

"I was nominated by a former Wipfli associate without my knowledge," Picher said. "The recognition was very special in that people see faith and values are important in an industry focused on financial matters and not normally associated with Faith."

The "Faith That Works" Award recognizes those in business who promote the common good and integrate their Catholic Faith into the workplace. For Pichler, his focus has always been on relationships. "The key is to be able to communicate to help (business people) understand what's important and help them make decisions in their life, whether it's for their business or for themselves personally, so they are comfortable with the decisions they make," he said.

Pichler, currently a member of St. Agnes Parish in Green Bay, grew up just down the block from Sacred Heart of Jesus Parish in Eau Claire. He says he has fond memories of his time at Regis High School and even credits Mr. Terry Allen for his decision to pursue a career in accounting.

"In my senior year of high school, I was hanging out in the training room when Terry Allen suggested I consider accounting," he remembered. "At that time I didn't know what it meant to be an accountant. In college, I took both heavy math and accounting courses. My original plan was to be a math teacher and football coach. When I

discovered accounting came easier to me than complex math, I just stayed on that track, and the rest is history!"

Pichler served as the partner in charge of the northeast Wisconsin region for Wipfli. His faith helped guide him as a leader at Wipfli and in his work throughout the community. For example, he served as the committee chair on an initiative to develop a culture called the "Wipfli Way".

"It's built on service, service excellence, service leadership, which draws from the teachings of Jesus," Pichler said. "Our service program is designed around helping others succeed. We call it 'Create a Lifetime Relationship.' How do you treat people if you want to have a lifetime relationship with someone? It creates a kind of language. You may not be using the term 'Catholic', but you are using the teaching of Jesus, how he treated people."

Pichler and his wife, Peg, were married in 1985 and have three children; Ryan, Molly, and Michael. They are grandparents to Claire. Having had a wonderful experience himself, Pichler said he also chose the path of a Catholic education for his children.

"We are blessed to have great schools in Wisconsin, public and private. We chose a Catholic education because having faith and values stressed everyday was important to us. We appreciated the smaller class sizes and personal attention the kids received. The focus on college preparation was also significant," he said.

Pichler says his experiences at Regis High School played an important role in his success in life. "Regis gave me a well-rounded education - adding to my strengths and improving areas where I wasn't as strong," he said. "I also played three sports (baseball, basketball, and football), even playing varsity level at an early age. My success in football led to being recruited and ultimately choosing St. Norbert College in the Green Bay area, which in turn led me to my wife and job. In addition, playing sports fed my competitive drive and taught me the importance of time management which I utilize to this day." He says there were many staff members at Regis who made an impact in his life, highlighting four in particular; Mike Nerbovig, Mary Kay Bissell, Pete Koupal, and Bill Uelmen.

Pichler's career and life have included many accolades. He was a finalist for an Ethics in Business award, received a Lifetime Achievement Recognition for time spent volunteering with the Boys and Girls Club, and most recently, was recognized with a Distinguished Alumni Award in Business by St. Norbert College.

He offers this message to his fellow Regis alumni and students as he begins this new chapter in life.

"Growing up on the near north side of Eau Claire and fairly introverted, some might have said you don't have what it takes to be successful," he said. "But with a willingness to put in the work, you learn anything is possible with a good education and a desire to be the best version of yourself, even for someone who is "just a kid from Eau Claire." This includes leading a geographic market for a top 20 CPA firm, chairing a key culture initiative for the Firm, and being the partner in charge of the accounts of two NFL teams. Along the way, you learn the key to life isn't too complex and was taught over 2,000 years ago - people and relationships matter, treat others how you would like to be treated (and even better). If you do that, everything else takes care of itself."
